

Forward Thinking

Your Next PC

As the holidays approach, I'm starting to get questions about purchasing a new PC. We review the new holiday machines in this issue (see page 82), but before you shop, you may want to do some planning.

Desktop or Notebook? Deciding between a desktop and notebook computer used to be easy: Only road warriors needed note-

books. But with larger screens, faster processors and graphics, and improved durability, notebooks now make sense as a primary computer even for people who move their computers only occasionally. If you're still undecided, take a look at the new high-

> end desktop replacement notebooks, many of which have 17-inch-wide screens, great speakers, and as much power as any computer on the market had a year or two ago. With a notebook, you get a smaller

board, and a bit less power for a higher cost than you would with an equivalently configured desktop. But you gain portability. Go to a store and take a

screen, a smaller key-

look at the new notebook screens and keyboards. You may be pleasantly surprised.

Windows PC or Mac? It used to be that you'd go for a Mac if you were into graphic design and get Windows for just about everything else. While that's still true for the vast majority of people, Macs are more appealing these days because of their great industrial design and because fewer viruses, worms, and other threats target Macs than Windows.

Macs are also great for Web browsing; they run a fine version of Microsoft Office and come with Apple's well-integrated iLife suite of basic photo, music, and DVD software. As for Linux, if it's right for you, you already know it-it's really for tinkerers. But for most people, Windows still offers a much wider HP Pavilion variety of hardware dv1000

choices, software titles, and prices. If you choose Windows, make sure you get a security suite and keep it up to date.

How much power do you need? Most people will be happy with a mainstream computer for everyday activities and even for watching video or recording TV. But if you're into gaming or interested in editing video then no system is fast enough. Today's top-end games

Apple iMac G5 often use every bit of processing and graphics power you can throw at them, and that split-

second advantage in response time can mean the difference between winning and losing.

Look for a lot of memory (at least 1GB of RAM), dual SATA hard drives in a RAID 0 array, and a highend graphics card (something based on an nVidia GeForce 6600 or an ATI Radeon X600 or better, and no less than 256MB of on-board RAM). For even more oomph, look for PCI Express for faster

graphics, an Extreme Edition Intel or AMD Athlon 64 FX processor, and maybe even two graphics cards using nVidia's SLI technology for speeding up some games.

If you're into video editing, you'll want a top-end processor, a midrange graphics card, and a second large-capacity, fast hard drive for capturing, editing, encoding, and storing video files. And don't forget backup. A writable DVD is a must, but even that won't handle the huge video files you might create with video software. I recommend an external hard drive.

For just about everyone else, any one of the current machines will do. I recommend 512MB of RAM. It's an inexpensive upgrade but will improve how fast your computer feels far more than a jump in processor power. There's no reason to settle for less than a 60GB hard drive or a screen smaller than 17 inches.

crucial, but you want to make sure you have a good TV tuner (look at the quality of the monitor), a great display, and a large hard drive, since TV

A New Way to Search

We all suffer from information overload. We've got way too many e-mails, files, photos, and the like to find anything. One solution is to index all your files so you can search through them just as you would on the Web. Since Google is practically a synonym for Web searching, it's not surprising the company is offering its own personal search tool. Google Desktop is a free download that lets you search Outlook or Outlook Express e-mail messages, AOL Instant Messenger conversations, Word, Excel, and PowerPoint documents, photographs, music files, and your Web history. Like similar programs, it does this by creating an index on your hard drive. What makes Google Desktop different from other search programs is that it returns results that look just like a Google Web search.

I've been a fan of indexing programs for a long time. I'm partial to XI at the moment, as it seems to be both the fastest and the most stable. But plenty of shows can take up a lot of space. Otherwise, Windows XP Home is fine for home users. Windows XP Professional is overkill in most home situations.

Once you've answered these questions, you can pick among the types of desktops (high-end, which includes gaming and multimedia machines; midrange; and all-in-one) and notebooks (high-end or desktop replacement, mainstream, value, and ultraportable) that we review in this issue's cover story.

While any computer today can connect you to the Web and do basic office functions, you're sure to find a lot more to do with your PC if you make the right choices up front.

other choices are available, including Creo Six Degrees and Copernic. Google Desktop doesn't offer nearly as many options as these programs. For instance, I like XI's columnar display of e-mail messages, which easily lets me narrow down a search.

I realize that not everyone wants to pay for such a search tool. Google Desktop seems destined to compete with a number of free utilities designed to integrate local searching and Web searching. Competitors include blinkx and Lookout, which Microsoft recently purchased.

Some people are worried about search tools and privacy. Other people are afraid the free software will always be limited and that it will prevent the paid programs from improving. I am concerned about both issues, but I think people will put up with a lot to find things on their computers. After all, isn't that information a lot more relevant than what's on the Web?

Gadgets of the Month at Digital Life

I had more fun at the recent DigitalLife show in New York than I've had at any of the big technology shows in recent years. That's mostly because we had thousands of computer users stop by our *PC Magazine* Digital Village to take a look at some of the hot gad-

gets for the holiday season. I expected crowds around the Media Center PCs and HDTVs, and I was not disappointed. But I was amazed at the positive reaction to a number of smaller gadgets that haven't gotten as much hype.

Packet8 showed a video phone that lets you see and talk to another video-phone user via broadband VoIP. Finger-Works showed its iGesture Pad, which looks like a touch pad you'd see on a notebook but is bigger and attached to a desktop PC. You can use this \$149 device like a mouse pad, but what makes it stand out is that it interprets movements you make with your hand to perform tasks like copy, cut, and paste.

Logitech's io2 Digital Writing System is a slightly lower-tech alternative to a tablet PC. You use a special pen to write on what looks like normal paper. Then when you dock the pen to your computer, your handwriting and notes are transferred into a special program, or into Word, OneNote, or your e-mail application. I talked to a number of people who didn't want to take a notebook computer everywhere but did want to get their notes into their machines. If you get a chance, check out these products.







Your Media Files Unbound

A new service aims to expand the reach of your multimedia content.

YOU'VE BEEN DUTIFULLY ripping your CD collection to your PC's hard drive, buying songs online, transferring images from your digital camera to your PC, and even recording TV shows you missed due to your busy schedule. But what good is that when your PC is in California and you're in Cleveland?

If ORB Networks has its way, plenty. The company is rolling out a service, recently seen at New York's DigitalLife show, that gives you ac-

cess to your homebound multimedia content on any device with a Web connection.

"The goal is to provide spontaneous access to your media, wherever it exists," says Jim Behrens, ORB's CEO. The impetus for the service, he says, was frustration with the growing number of multimedia file types (three leading music formats, conflicting video schemes, half a dozen image types) and access devices.

With ORB's technology, you don't have to worry about file formats; that intelligence resides within the 10MB client applet on a home PC. When pinged remotely, the client resizes the file to match your device's resolution and connection speed, then sends the file via ORB's secure server.

The communication is twoway: If you snap photos with your camera phone, you can send them back to the My Photos directory on your home PC. And if you want your Media Center DVR to record TV while vou're

gone, you can set it remotely.

The service, initially available only to users with Microsoft Windows XP Media Center Edition host PCs, will arrive in late November for \$9.99 per month (or \$79.99 per year). If all goes well, ORB will open the service to all Windows users early in 2005.

Meanwhile, Microsoft has advanced its Media Center Edition 2005 software, with an eye toward covering new Media Center Extender devices of various kinds. Next year, look for many choices when expanding the reach of your multimedia content.—*Jamie M. Bsales*

lt's a Snap

BILL GROSS, from the Idealab dot-com incubator, has a new angle on Web searches. At October's Web 2.0 conference in San Francisco, Gross unveiled a prerelease version of Snap (*www.snap.com*), a search engine that incorporates site visitor feedback and executes search refinements as you type them.

Snap puts search results into rows and columns; you can then re-sort them by clicking on column headings. For example, Popularity orders search results by how they've fared with other site visitors. The engine uses technology licensed from X1 and delivers results that vary widely from those returned by other search engines.

Snap isn't fully cooked, and Gross admits to some compatibility problems with the Firefox browser. But it seems it will give power searchers much flexibility.—*SR*

Spies Behind Bars



HAS YOUR BROWSER been hijacked lately? The biggest crackdown on spyware yet got underway in October when the House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed a bill declaring spyware illegal. The bill imposes stiff penalties on violators, including up to

five years in prison, as well as fines.

The Internet Spyware (I-SPY) Prevention Act of 2004 outlaws accessing a computer without authorization, engaging in identity theft, impairing the security protections of a computer, and more. It also calls for \$10 million to go to the Department of Justice to combat spyware and phishing scams.—*SR*

Want TV on Your Cell Phone?

Camera phone technology has caught on like wildfire, and many analysts predict that TV will be the next hot item on cell phones. But more than half of cell phone users say they are not at all or not very interested. Many cite disruptive and inappropriate phone use as a reason for their lack of interest.

Movie Date

THE LAG TIME between movie and TV screens may be shrinking. Netflix and TiVo are partnering to develop entertainment offerings, including video on demand. TiVo allows digital downloading of TV programming, while Netflix provides its Internet subscribers with rentals of over 25,000 DVDs, with titles arriving via U.S. mail. The new partnership could earn TiVo subscribers a vast new content library and offer Netflix subscribers a faster delivery process: PC to TiVo to TV.



"We really see DVDs as being a dominant force now and a more dominant one in five years," says Netflix spokesperson Shernaz Daver. "We also believe that video content distribution will be a big market for Netflix."

Hollywood might not be so eager to cooperate, though, says Akitya Kishore, senior analyst at The Yankee Group. "Major studios release their movies in a series of windows. First the theaters, then airlines, then rentals, and finally video on demand, which is 45 to 52 days after video rental."

He adds that Netflix receives its new releases in the rental window, when the studios earn the bulk of their post-theater revenue. The ways Hollywood will allow digital delivery of movie content are uncertain, but Kishore is convinced that Netflix will have to wait for the video-on-demand window.—Karen Jones

The 411 on SMS

TRADITIONAL 411 SERVICE is facing a new threat. Rather than dialing 411 from your cell phone to look up a number or find an address, you could try two new short message service (SMS) programs that are offering free searches. Send a text query using SMS on a cell



phone, and a text reply will provide address and phone number listings. That can amount to significant savings for people paying \$1.25 to call 411. On many wireless plans, SMS services are essentially free.

The king of search engines has launched the most extensive SMS 411 service: Google SMS. It provides addresses, phone numbers, and restaurant listings. Simply send a query, such as "pizza 10021," to 46645 (GOOGL on most phones) and Google SMS will reply with all the pizza parlors in that ZIP code. Furthermore, shoppers can use the service to find out product prices, wordsmiths can look up definitions, and diners can calculate tips.

"You don't want the whole damned Web on your cell phone, you just want things such as addresses, phone numbers, directions, and traffic updates," says T.J. Morey, VP of marketing for Synfonic. Synfonic offers its own free 411 SMS service. Send the state and business name to 650-430-7183, and Synfonic returns a text message with the address and phone number. It can also suggest similar businesses nearby.

If SMS and dial-pad letter sequences are still Greek to you, Synfonic has another solution. Go to *www.synfonic.com*, and set up your own shortcuts, such as S for Starbucks. That way, you can stay caffeinated and connected.—*John R. Quain*

MY BIO FILE

The FDA has approved Applied Digital's VeriChip, a ricesize, implantable **RFID** chip that lets a doctor swipe a handheld scanner over a patient to obtain a complete medical history. Once scanned, the chip—inserted by injection-wirelessly sends an encrypted code that allows the doctor Internet database access.

Staffers at the attorney general's office in Mexico are already "chipped" for security identification scanning. But several Christian Web sites oppose the FDA approval, calling the subcutaneous chip the Mark of the Beast.

Sharing Music and More, Freely

AS EVERYONE'S COLLECTION of digital media expands, new ways to share are arriving. Two music-minded veterans of the dot-com boom have launched an application called Grouper (www.grouper.com), which lets up to 30 family members or friends define a closed group for sharing photos, music, and other content. The application is free for the moment and has some unusual features, including one that allows group members to stream songs back and forth without violating copyright laws.

Grouper CEO Josh Felser and president David Samuel cofounded Spinner, which AOL bought in 1999 for \$320 million



and rebranded as AOL Radio now among the largest online broadcasters. The two cite limitations on sharing features at other services as the reason they created Grouper. "E-mails would be blocked because media files were too big," says Felser. "Burning discs or memory sticks for friends took hours and cost too much. Uploading files to Web sites was painfully slow."

Felser notes that peerto-peer features, limited group size, and a free sharing model are Grouper's strong points. "It streams music from PC to PC, which does not violate copyright law

because it's classified as a private performance," he says. "One of my frustrations with Ofoto," says Felser, "has been that I can't just let friends print out pictures stored there. They have to pay. With Grouper, they can browse thumbnails of photos on my hard drive and download whichever ones they want."—SR

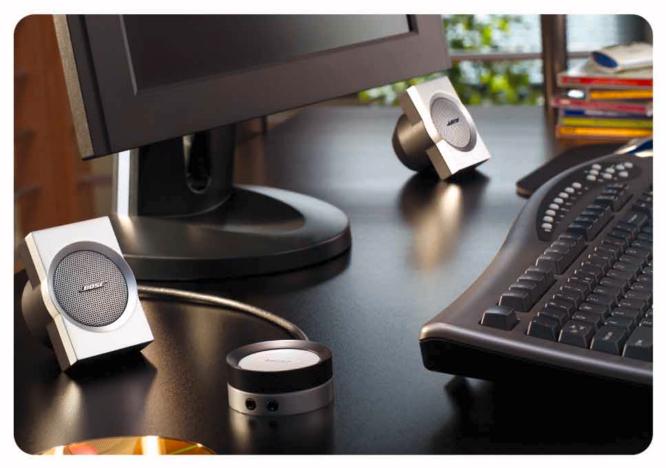

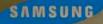



Surf in Secret

THE MAGAZINE WORLD'S LARGEST COMPUTER-TESTING FACILITY

By now, you know. They're watching you. As you surf the Web, it's ridiculously easy for someone to track your activity. The sites you visit can track you, and worse still, your IT administrator can track you. • If you want your private behavior to remain private, you need a utility that can camouflage your Internet traffic and

keep your surfing anonymous. Here, we review a quartet of anonymity apps: Anonymizer 2004, Bypass, GhostSurf 2005 Platinum, and Steganos Internet

Anonym Pro 7. All four operate in the same basic way. When you make a Web request, rather than sending it straight to the site you're trying to visit, thse apps first route it through a remote proxy server, masking your IP address in the process.

The request still goes through your normal proxy server, but your ultimate destination is hidden, so your administrator (or other party who might be snooping on the line) can't easily track where you're surfing. And since your IP address is masked, thirdparty sites can't track you. For further protection, Anonymizer, Bypass, and GhostSurf will actually encrypt your requests, so not even someone listening in on the wire can track you.

Anonymizer 2004

The name says it all. Anonymizer keeps your Web requests anonymous-and that's about it. Each time you make a call to the

Web, Anonymizer routes it through the company's private proxy servers, masking your IP address. If you like, you can even encrypt each request with 128-bit Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) encryption, so not even someone listening on the wire can snoop on your Web traffic.

Yes, this means that a single organization is handling all your Web activity. But the company insists that, although all your requests go through its servers, nothing is ever written to disk, and hence there is no permanent record. Even if the company were subpoenaed, it claims, it wouldn't be able to divulge any information about vou.

For the most part, during testing at PC Magazine Labs, the app performed as it should, correctly masking and encrypting our Web requests. But it did malfunction when we tried to use Outlook Web Access, a Web-based e-mail application. This was not a known bug, but the company says it will soon


be fixed. And in the grand scheme of things, this is no more than an annoyance. There's little need to hide your IP from your own e-mail server, and you can always turn off Anonymizer when accessing it. (Still, GhostSurf's solution-to let you set the app to ignore particular sites—is preferable.)

Turning Anonymizer on and off is a breeze. You can do so from a button integrated with vour Web browser or from a standalone window. The app's price (\$29.99 for a year's subscription) is reasonable, but doesn't compare well with the one-time fee of \$49.95 asked by GhostSurf (our favorite tool in this category).

And unlike competitors, Anonymizer doesn't include any additional privacy tools, such as an Internet trace cleaner or a spyware detector. For those, you'll have to upgrade to Anonymizer Safe Surfing Suite (\$49.99 a year). For even more protection, Anonymizer Total Net Shield (\$99.95 a year) does all that the other two utilities handle, and also masks e-mail. IM, and newsgroup traffic; blocks pop-up windows; and filters spam.

BYPASS LETS you get around IT department restrictions and even features 128-bit encryption. So if other anonymizer sites are blocked, Bypass can still let you surf in private.

Bypass Proxy Client 0.78

What if your IT administrator or a public ISP (say, at a hotel) gets wise to the anonymity market? What if these entities start blocking access to the proxy servers run by companies like Anonymizer and GhostSurf? Well, we wholeheartedly encourage you to abide by your company's IT policies. But since you asked, there is a way around them: Bypass Proxy Client 0.78.

Much like Anonymizer and GhostSurf, the Bypass Proxy Client encrypts your Internet requests and reroutes them through its own servers. But in addition to offering the client, the company offers Bypass Portal Server, letting you set up your own remote proxy server on another machine. You can route all requests through, say, your home machine before sending them on to Bypass's servers, and IT will be none the wiser. Not only that, Bypass can reroute all sorts of Internet traffic—not just HTTP requests. It handles FTP, SMTP, POP3, NEWS, SOCKS4, and SOCKS5, so it can anonymously reroute nearly everything you do on the Web, from newsgroup to P2P filesharing requests.

Unfortunately, this powerful application isn't for novices. When you set up the client, you'll have to change a few settings on your Web browser and any other client you wish to mask requests from. And unless you carefully read the support page on the company's Web site, you won't realize this is necessary. Needless to say, setting up the proxy server to reroute requests to your own machine is even more difficult.

Bypass is a subscription service. If you pay \$5.95 a month, you can transfer 50MB of data per day at speeds of up to 120



Kbps. For \$9.95 a month, you can transfer 100MB at 200 Kbps. There's a free option as well, but it's almost too slow to use, and it restricts you to only two transfer protocols at a time. If you're a hardcore, advanced Internet user and you can afford the \$10 a month, Bypass is the way to go. If not, you should probably look elsewhere.

With our Editors' Choice in this group, anonymity is just the beginning. In addition to masking your IP address, GhostSurf 2005 Platinum provides all sorts of additional privacy tools, including a full copy of the company's standalone antispyware application, SpyCatcher.

When Tenebril first introduced GhostSurf in 2001, the app masked your IP address by routing your requests through various public servers, much as Steganos Internet Anonym Pro 7 (reviewed here in a sidebar) does. The company soon switched, however, to its own, private servers for GhostSurf, claiming that public servers were not only hard to trust but often terribly unstable. The new private server methodalso favored by Anonymizer 2004-works beautifully. If you like, you can even encrypt your Internet requests, hiding them from anyone who might listen on the wire. All your traffic does travel through Tenebril's server, but the company claims nothing is ever cached.

free software add-ons, it can mask newsgroup and IRC traffic. Conveniently (and unlike the other anonymity tools we've tested), the app even lets you compile a list of Web sites where you *don't* want your identity masked. In some cases, you'll want a site to know who you are so they can customize content, store certain information on your behalf, or provide special services. With this feature, you avoid the tedium of continually switching your anonymity utility on and off.

GhostSurf also provides several other privacy tools. Its AdArmor tool can block pop-up windows, ActiveX controls, and other scripts. The TracksCleaner tool lets you erase local traces of Internet activity. And Personal Data Vault lets you hide all your system passwords and other sensitive system data behind heavy encryption. It also lets you "shred" electronic documents, so they can't be recovered from your hard drive. You can even use the Personal Data Vault as a backup tool, saving encrypted data to removable media or external drives.

Even better, the company includes its SpyCatcher module (\$29.95 if purchased separately) to keep spyware at bay. This utility scans your hard drive and identifies known spyware programs that have already infiltrated your system, then flags new threats as you surf.

The one item missing is a tool to encrypt e-mail traffic (which Anonymizer offers in an add-on module). Still, all told, GhostSurf 2005 Platinum is quite a bargain.

Private Surfing in the Public Eye

ou could call it public privacy. Unlike the other three products reviewed here, **Steganos Internet Anonym Pro** *doesn't* route your Web requests through its own servers. Instead, it routes them through myriad *third-party* servers. This is a good thing, and a bad thing. On the one hand, no single organization can track your behavior in full. On the other, several organizations can track your behavior in part, and you have no way of knowing how trustworthy they are.

Steganos is a wonderfully slick app offering all sorts of privacy tools. But, before purchasing, you should realize that it taps into public servers you have no way of knowing anything about. Moreover, the use of third-party servers means your data can't be encrypted. Someone listening on the wire could still track your behavior.

When you first install the product, it immediately trolls the Web and establishes a list of available proxy servers it can use to mask your identity. This took a good half hour when we tested the app at PC Magazine Labs, but once the list is established, you can hide your Web identity simply by clicking a button. At first, the app will, say, route your requests through a proxy in France. Then it switches to one in the Netherlands. Then one in Spain. And so on.

If you like, you can instruct the app to settle on just one server, but playing proxy roulette is the way to go. If one server goes down, the app simply switches to another. Your browser performance does slow down noticeably at first, but the more you run Steganos, the faster it gets. Unfortunately, a few days after

installation, we ran into a few performance issues above and beyond the normal browser slowdown. On two different machines, the app seemed to seriously interfere with our Internet—not only when it was up and running but when it was completely closed out. On one machine, it seemed to put a drag on our browser that made it all but unusable and severely crippled our Outlook client. On the other, it unexpectedly interfered with certain Web scripts and downloads. Only uninstalling the product fixed the issues. The company says it frequently encounters "incompatibility" problems with the product, that "in order to support any possible outbound HTTP traffic Internet Anonym has to wire itself deeply into the network components of Windows and this is a very fragile and delicate area."

Steganos integrates with your browser, but you can also run it as a standalone window. And in either case, you can see where your requests are being routed, the app displaying a map of the world and a flashing icon that points to your current proxy server. More important, Steganos includes all sorts of other privacy tools. You can change your browser ID. You can disable all cookies, ActiveX controls, and various other scripts. And you can even encrypt your favorites, in case someone comes snooping around your machine.

The \$59.95 Pro version of the product also includes a free copy of Steganos Internet Trace Destructor, which not only can destroy local traces of your Internet activity, but can irrevocably shred documents sitting on your hard drive.—*CM*



Disney's Vision of a Kid-Friendly PC

I f you have a child between the ages of 4 and 12, Disney is already a big part of your life—Disney movies, the Disney Channel, Radio Disney, and now (the company hopes) the **Disney Dream Desk PC**. This affordable desktop, built for Disney by German

electronics giant Medion. won't blow anyone away with its performance or feature set, but it has all the components you would need to run basic tasks. It also includes some appealing Disney-themed software extras, and it has a funky design to boot. Given the fan base, it could be a system that works where other kidoriented systems failed.

The monitor is shaped like Mickey Mouse's head, albeit in bright blue silhouette. His instantly recognizable ears sit prominently atop the 15-inch LCD and house the speakers, and while they can't crank tunes to an ear-splitting level, they do a decent job with game and music playback. Conceived by frog design (the firm responsible for the Disney-branded electronics seen in Target and Circuit City as well as countless other products), the monitor will attract younger would-be users, but older kids might feel it's too babyish. If your kids are in the 8-to-12 age bracket, you might want to delete the monitor from the build sheet and put the \$299 toward a cooler (read: regularlooking) display. Aside from the monitor's look, we found its image quality a little washed-out compared with that of other 15-inch screens.

The system chassis is a squat

tower (in a kid-friendly blue and yellow) that fits nicely behind the display for an all-inone look. The sliding door on the back of the case keeps inquisitive fingers away from the cables and ports (including the power cable), but don't bother looking back there if you

parent or guardian, it can prevent a user accidentally stumbling

> on objectionable content. Be sure to setup the **ContentWatch** suite before giving the PC to your kids, since it comes "open" (that is, without any filters set up). While the filtering is enabled out of the box. if

your child sets the PC up for you he or

she will know the password to get into the ContentWatch settings and will thus be able to get around the suite's contentblocking system.

You can also set up the ContentWatch suite to notify you via e-mail if there are repeated attempts to access blocked material or objectionable words and images in chat sessions. You can even use the program to enforce time limits on the Web or on e-mail, and to display reports on what sites your child is surfing. One thing we did notice is that the filtering software uses up a little of the CPU's horsepower: Web sites we surfed using a similarly equipped vanilla system came up faster than on the Dream PC.

The unit comes with a wellwritten user manual, with how-to descriptions of tasks like burning a CD or working

the music programs on the system. The Disney-branded games and educational programs mean that this PC is ready for hours of fun after you unpack it, and the Disney.com button on the keyboard means that days of Disney content are just a click away. Disney Flix (home movies), Disney Pix (drawing and photos), and Disney Mix (music) encourage creative play. They also sync well with Disney's optional peripherals, like the Disney 1.3 Megapixel digital still camera (\$79), Disney-Lexmark printer (part of a \$950 package on disneydirect.com), and Disney Digital Camcorder (\$99).

The low-end 2.66 GHz Celeron 330 processor, 256MB of RAM, integrated graphics, and 5,400-rpm hard drive (only a 40GB unit) conspire to prevent the Dream PC from becoming a performance leader, even among valuepriced PCs. But it is adequate for educational programs and surfing the Internet. Thankfully, the unit has an 8X AGP slot, making it easy to upgrade the system to run the latest 3D games. (If you do, be sure to upgrade the 256MB of memory using one of the three free DIMM slots.)

The Disney Dream Desk PC shines as a kids' system: The design, included software and symbiosis with Disney's online properties make it hard to ignore. Sure, you can get a faster machine for the same price, but it won't have Mickey ears.

Portable GPS: Get There from Here

obile professionals and weekend adventurers have at least one thing in common: The need to find their way in

often unfamiliar terrain. While you can spend a bundle on a luxury car or SUV outfitted with a builtin GPS system to help you along, a more affordable and practical solution is one of the new standalone navigation

units designed for in-car use. After all, you can move it from one vehicle to the next, and when the system becomes obsolete, you don't have to ditch the whole vehicle.

We tested four of the latest offerings to see which could get us there from here and back again. All did a good job getting us around Manhattan, northern New Jersey, and Long Island. The standout in the group, though, was the Tom-Tom GO. It provides the most intuitive, easiest-to-navigate interface we've seen so far, and its superior 3D point of view more naturally mimics a driver's visual perspective.

COBRA NAV ONE 3000

When we unpacked the Cobra Nav One 3000 we were excited. The Nav One is extremely well made, housed in a solid aluminum casing

with a beautifully machined (and sturdy) windshield mount. It is larger than its competitors, but the size is forgivable: It's one of the few units with a hard drive (which holds detailed maps

for the entire lower 48 states, Hawaii, and metropolitan areas of Canada) and it features a built-in gyroscope for calculating speed and location when the unit loses its GPS signal.

The product is also equipped with a 5.2-inch screen—the largest available in its category.



THE BIG SCREEN is welcome, but the interface of the Nav One 3000 needs work.

Unfortunately, this did not translate into an easier-to-read map on the screen. Rather than using the display to show extended map information, the Nav One devotes a large portion of it to soft-button icons. We were also disappointed by its 2D maps, which are often confusing and crowded, especially in city environments. Street names are squished onto the road they describe. We often found ourselves staring at the screen to decipher oddly grouped and sometimes overlapping letters. Be prepared to rely more on the system's voice commands (available in English, French and Spanish) than on the actual map.

There were a couple of interface fea-

tures we liked. For instance, the Nav One switches to a detail view when you are approaching a turn. An hourglass-like progress bar indicates how far you are from the turn and the screen displays a large snapshot view of the intersection

or road fork ahead. Another feature that comes in handy is the Planned Route screen, which displays a list of all upcoming maneuvers pertaining to your route.

Planning your path or entering a destina-

tion, on the other hand, led to a lot of frustration. The device lacks a touch screen, so instead of picking letters from a virtual keyboard, you scroll through the alphabet by moving a joystick up or down; after selecting one you must move the cursor to the right to choose another. Entering city or street names was tedious and time-consuming.

We would have considered the Nav One a noble effort a few years ago. But by today's standards, its display and interface are in urgent need of an overhaul.

Weighing in at only 5.8 oz, the Navman iCN 510 is a battery-op-

erated GPS that provides spoken, turn-by-turn directions (you can choose a male or female voice). The iCN 510 measures a mere 4.75 by 2.75 by .75 inches and has a 3.5-inch touch screen. It comes with complete street-level map data for the United States (in three CDs) as well as

States (in three CDs) as well as POI (Point of Interest) data.

When you first power up the iCN 510, it doesn't contain any map information. The installation software uses Microsoft's ActiveSync to upload your selection of map data for the base map and the individual states you select. You control the iCN 510 either via the touch screen interface (there's an included stylus as well) or with the six keys and rocker-style switch.

You have a choice of either a 2D map with north at the top or a 3D bird's-eye map with user-selectable viewing perspective.

To navigate, you can input an address, select a POI, or navigate to a town center. You can also

select from shortcuts and favorites. The navigation screen shows a preview of your next turn as well as upcoming-turn instruction.

Overall, the iCN 510 is easy to use and is a good value. But if you don't need a batteryoperated device and have a few more dollars to spend, consider the top-of-the line iCN 635. It features a spectacular 4-inch screen that is easy to view even in bright sunlight. The UI and map data are identical to that of the iCN 510, but this unit uses an infrared receiver (IR) remote rather than a touch screen. Though it takes longer to enter data with the IR remote, the screen stays finger-

print-free. The larger speaker in the iCN 635 also provides better sound than the iCN 510.

Though the screen is smaller than factory-installed in-car systems, the quality of the display and the features make the iCN siblings a viable alternative to an OEM navigation system.

What we've always expected from a GPS navigation system is ability to enter a destination address as quickly and efficiently as possible and to receive clear audio and visual instructions promptly. On all counts, the TomTom GO delivers. The GO is the easiest-to-use in-car GPS system we've reviewed yet.

Housed in a curvy and relatively small case, the lightweight GO comes with a suction cup windshield mount and an adhesive bracket for ondash installation. The lack of buttons on the GO might surprise you at first, but access to the features is provided via touch screen.

Navigating the system's interface is exceptionally simple; its large, easy-to-read icons provide access to all operational features. At no point are you required to fiddle with a stylus or to weed through hard-to-find submenus, as you are on the Cobra and Navman entries. And the GO will run for 5 to 6 hours on a full battery charge, which allows you to fully disconnect from the cigarette-lighter adapter.

The included CD contains the main application and streetlevel maps of all 50 states (state or regional level), which can be uploaded through the mini-USB port onto the 256MB SD card located on the front of the GO.

Getting started with the GO is a pleasure. Multiple destination routes and an extensive POI database are available, and

simple A-to-B navigation by address is easily entered into the system. The GO first asks for the city name, then displays all matches, based on the loaded state maps. This was far more convenient than Cobra's system, which requires you to enter the state first. Route instructions are relayed by voice and rendered in 3D (they can also be displayed as text).

The quality of GO's 3D map was far superior to any products we've tested in the past. The maps are a closer approximation to the driver's perspective than 2D versions and make it easy, even in dense city environments, to see upcoming turns. The zoom feature provides even more detail or, alternatively, a broader overview of the surrounding area. You can even adjust the preferences to left- or right-hand display.



has great features not found on other portable GPS systems.

Switching to night mode when it's dark allows you to anticipate upcoming sharp turns in the road—a great additional safety feature. When driving under overpasses or in tunnels, the system switches on its ASN (Assisted Satellite Navigation) feature, a technology that calculates your position in the absence of a GPS signal based on information from internal position sensors.

The most surprising feature, however, is the quality of the built-in speaker and voice. We could not believe at first that the little speaker on the back of the unit was producing such full-

bodied sound. Inside the car you might think that "Laurie," the friendly navigator, was sitting right beside you.

Our only criticism is that the screen is very receptive to glare-common to all touch screens-and can become unreadable when hit by direct sunlight. But overall, the TomTom GO is the first device to deliver ease of use, accuracy, a great display, and superior sound rolled up into one sleek package.

Staying on Course

hy buy travel and mapping software when zero-cost directions are a couple of clicks away on the Web at MapQuest or Yahoo!? Well, your answer may be because online maps are dinky and often produce hard-to-read printouts. Those who want better results really need PC-based mapping software, and the 2005 edition of the best-selling Microsoft Streets & Trips is one of the best available.

For 2005, in addition to the standalone software available for \$40 (street). Microsoft offers a second bundle that includes a USB GPS receiver (from Pharos) for \$115 (street). The GPS is compact, installs quickly, and can also be used with Pocket PC PDAs or smart phones (Pocket PCenabled mobile phones) with the purchase of a CompactFlash expansion sled (\$45) or Bluetooth module (\$90). If you already have an NMEA 2.0-compliant GPS receiver, Microsoft has also improved the wizard that helps you make that work too.

Streets & Trips 2005's many little improvements are enough to rationalize upgrading if your software is a couple of years old. Several new or improved features have been unfurled, including a GPS pane that



displays your heading, speed, and latitude/longitude; a reroute-from-here feature if you go off course; more accurate map data; and more ways to customize your maps. It also now lists 1.8 million points of interest, up from one million two years ago.

None of the mapping products available are perfect. But the people working on Streets & Trips have done a good job with the improvements, making the competition all the more intense.—Bill Howard

Photoshop Elements: Still the Best

Adobe has taken two sibling applications, Г Photoshop Elements MAGAZINE and Photoshop Album, EDITORS' CHOICE and combined them into a single solution that will meet all the needs of budding digital photographers. The result, known simply as Adobe Photoshop Elements 3.0, is a complete digital-imaging package comprising the Editor component, for fixing up images, and the new Organizer component, for cataloging and searching your burgeoning digital photo collection.

Adobe has done a great job of getting the parts to work together. Elements 3's Welcome screen lets you pick which component you want to launch first; whichever you choose, there are handy buttons in the interface to launch the other component at any time. For instance, you can use Organizer to

find a specific photo and then send it to Editor with just a click.

Organizer is the best imagemanagement solution we've seen, as it adds some handy new features not found in the standalone Photoshop Album (yet), such as Boolean tag searches to go along with all the old tools and tricks. Organizer also gives you plenty of options for sharing photos. You can print projects like calendars and postcards, create Web-based photo galleries, easily attach photos to customized e-mail messages, and produce slide shows and burn them to Video CDs.

Elements 3's Editor boasts both a redesigned interface and easier access to powerful tools. New image-editing tools include Photoshop's amazing Healing Brush, which lets you easily remove blemishes and imperfections from photos. Meanwhile, a new Quick Fix mode offers an even simpler interface to Elements—it's a perfect choice for imageediting newbies.

We do have a few complaints, though. For example, we are surprised that you can't pan and zoom in on images in slide shows—a handy feature that is becoming fairly standard in similar apps. The filters and layer styles are confusingly implemented. Still, this is easily the best choice available for organizing and editing your digital photos.

Entry-Level Studio No Match for Elements

igital image enthusiasts looking for an approachable editing and management package are the target of the new **Paint Shop Pro** Studio. Like Adobe Photoshop Elements 3, PSP Studio provides a complete solution for editing and organizing digital images. But when the two products are compared, Adobe's generosity in selecting features for Photoshop Elements 3—which has many of the powerful tools found in Photoshop, including the Healing Brush-casts Jasc's stinginess in striking relief.

For example, PSP Studio has no adjustment layers and no History palette, and offers less than half of Paint Shop Pro 9's effects filters. Even more crippling are the sparse tools for correcting color and contrast. As a beginner you might not mind these omissions, but PSP Studio affords little room for users to evolve bevond the basics.

In contrast with Adobe's approach in Elements 3, Jasc hasn't done much to make PSP Studio easier to use than Paint Shop Pro. The animated Get Started Guide screen is of very little educational value. There is an excellent Learning Center,

but Paint Shop Pro 9 has exactly the same feature. The main reason PSP Studio is easier to use is simply the lack of advanced features that might distract some users.

Although the included Paint Shop Photo Album 5 is a very

good program for organizing and sharing your digital image collection, it comes up short when compared with Photoshop Elements 3's Organizer component. You can do slide shows, but PSP Album lacks the advanced features and control offered by competing products, such as Photoshop Elements and even Microsoft Digital Image Suite 10.

PSP Studio's tools are effective. But despite a few unique features, such as a Bezier pen tool for drawing paths, the application is too limited.

A bundle of the full Paint Shop Pro 9 and Paint Shop Photo Album 5 Deluxe Edition would be much more in

line with what Adobe Photoshop Elements 3 has to offer. As it stands, the only argument for Paint Shop Pro Studio is its price.

Two Suite Approaches to Complete Security

Thile PC-savvy security mavens may prefer to install individual best-of-breed antivirus, firewall, antispam, and antispyware utilities, most PC users are better served by a path of lesser resistance: An integrated all-inone suite, which is less expensive than buying individual apps and avoids the possibility of incompatibility between security modules. After all, you don't want your antivirus and antispam tools dueling for control of the incoming e-mail stream. Two of the biggest names in PC security-McAfee and Norton-have recently released new versions of their suites, so we put each to the test.

McAfee Internet Security 2005 7.0

The new McAfee's Internet Security 2005 7.0 suite bundles McAfee SpamKiller 6.0 (First Looks, November 2), McAfee VirusScan 9.0 (First Looks, November 2), McAfee Personal Firewall Plus 6.0, and the subscription-only McAfee Privacy Service 7.0. MIS 2005's Security Center manages these four modules and also

tracks Windows Update status, effectively replacing the Windows XP SP2 Security Center.

SpamKiller filters any POP3 e-mail account, regardless of the e-mail client used. It can filter Exchange and IMAP accounts under Microsoft Outlook and will process MSN and Hotmail accounts directly. You can add individual addresses or the entire contents of your Address Book to

a Friends list; mail from these senders will never be blocked. As we noted in our earlier review, in our testing SpamKiller erroneously identified about 4 percent of valid mail as spam and failed to block one-fourth of the actual spam—far worse performance than the leading antispam products.

VirusScan received Checkmark certification from West Coast Labs (*www.west*

coast.com) for virus detection, virus removal, and Trojan detection. Virus Bulletin (www.virusbtn.com) recognizes it with a VB 100% award, and the utility is certified by ICSA Labs (www .icsalabs.com) for virus detection, though not for virus removal. VirusScan scans files on access, on demand, and on schedule, and it scans inbound and outbound e-mail as

well as IM attachments. The WormStopper module blocks suspicious outgoing e-mails too many recipients, or too many e-mail messages generated in a short time—but unfortunately produces a pop-up for every message exceeding the limits. It doesn't log viruses it has repaired or deleted but does attempt to remove "potentially unwanted programs," or PUPs

(spyware or adware). And we are impressed with its detailed virus database and interactive world map of virus infestations.

The firewall in MIS 2005 is preconfigured to allow or block

over 700 known programs, thus reducing the number of popups requiring user response. It can alert you to inbound and outbound connection requests from unknown programs. In

testing, the McAfee firewall blocked all significant port attacks and defended itself against direct attacks on the firewall process. However, it failed all but one of our leak tests (which duplicate techniques a Trojan horse could use to masquerade as a permitted program). If a new, unknown worm or Trojan surfaces using such techniques,

this firewall won't keep it from phoning home.

McAfee's Privacy Service prevents personal data from going out over the wires and includes parental-control features as well. As the administrator, you define any number of data items in categories like Phone, Credit Card, Social Security, and so on. The data itself is stored in an encrypted database, and portions of sensitive

items (like account numbers) are obscured in the list of data items. If the administrator attempts to send any protected data element via e-mail, IM, or a Web page, the privacy service will ask whether or not to block it. Other users don't get a choice: Private information is automatically replaced by the string "mcgdog."

In addition to securing per-

sonal data, MIS 2005 lets parents create global lists of blocked and allowed Web sites, set an overall policy on cookie acceptance, and globally block Web bugs, banner ads, and pop-up ads. You also control access for all other users of the system. Each user is assigned to one of five age groups, from young child to adult. Those not in the adult group are limited to age-

appropriate sites and cannot access any sites on the blocked list. In addition, you can set up a schedule of days and times when each user is allowed access. Access attempts that are blocked due to content or schedule are logged for your review. Privacy Service user accounts are not tied to Windows user log-ons, so McAfee recommends setting the system to log the user on initially with the fewest possible privileges-and for the master account holder always to remember to log off.

All told, MIS 2005 combines an excellent antivirus tool with a good personal firewall and a so-so antispam module. And the privacy and parental-control features are a nice bonus. The suite is a reasonable solution, especially for anyone already using one or more of these McAfee utilities. For those making a fresh start, we'd recommend the Norton entry instead.

Norton Internet Security 2005



Norton Internet Security 2005 bundles together the standalone Norton AntiSpam CHOICE 2005 (NAS), Norton AntiVirus 2005 (First Looks,

November 2), and Norton Personal Firewall 2005 (First Looks, November 16) utilities. It adds privacy control, parental control, and a handy overall console that displays an overview of all NIS 2005 modules, with options to configure individual features or get more detailed status reports.

Norton AntiSpam integrates specifically with Outlook, Outlook Express, and Eudora, but can protect any POP3 account regardless of the e-mail client used. While it does not support IMAP or Exchange accounts, it can process Hotmail and Yahoo! accounts directly. You can train the spam filter by pointing out any valid mail identified as spam or vice versa. After a short training period, in our testing the utility's accuracy was very good, approaching that of MailFrontier Desktop 4.0. Accuracy is improved by populating Norton AntiSpam's whitelist with your address book and those to

whom you send mail. Its AutoBlock feature aims at blocking phishing scams and other malicious spam but may accidentally catch valid mail.

Norton AntiVirus (NAV) is still our top choice for standalone virus protection, and its scanning integrates seamlessly with that of Norton AntiSpam. Independent labs recognize its accuracy: NAV

received all three Checkmarks from West Coast Labs and a Virus Bulletin VB 100% award. It is certified by ICSA Labs for both virus detection and cleaning, and it scores 100 percent for detection with AV-Test. It scans inbound and outbound e-mail

and IM attachments, and logs all viruses found. An online virus database provides details of just what was stopped. And by default it also scans for spyware. adware. dialers, and other threats. Our only real gripe is that it flags viruses even when they've already been neutralized by a server-side antivirus tool. The standalone

The suite's integrated Privacy Control can block or warn when any user sends out personal information, such as credit card numbers and passwords. For each item, you can specify whether it's okay to enter that data in an IM client, an e-mail message, or a Web site. Itemspecific exceptions let you control data further, so, for example, your eBay password can be allowed on the real eBay site but blocked if you enter it on a phishing scam imitation of eBay. But the protection isn't perfect. All users registered to a given PC share the same data-

base of private information, and that master list of items doesn't mask any data, so you can't hide your account numbers from the kids if they have a valid Windows XP log-on. Symantec advises entering only the last portion of account numbers or other sensitive information.

The Browser Privacy feature provides

a degree of anonymous browsing by suppressing standard information that Web sites can normally get from your browser. Among these are the type of computer and browser you're using and the URL of the site you linked in from. It can also block animated images, scripts, and flash animation, and by default it blocks ads from a list of specific advertising sites.

The suite has features for parental control that will block sites in any or all of over 30 categories from Adult Humor to Weapons, on a per-user basis. You can allow a user to access a specific site that would otherwise be

blocked, or choose to block all sites except those on a permitted list that you define yourself. You can also choose what types of Internet-aware applications each user is allowed, perhaps disabling file sharing, IM, or network games. If desired, you can block access to newsgroups based on words in the name (for example, *alt.sex*) or allow only specific newsgroups. Unlike the McAfee suite's parental controls, those of the Norton suite make no provision for limiting access to specific days and times. On the plus side, also unlike the McAfee suite's, Norton's parental-control accounts are wisely linked to Windows logon accounts.

The antivirus and firewall elements in Norton Internet Security-the most important elements-are top-of-the-line choices, and Norton's antispam feature is also very good. The privacy and parental control elements are well implemented, though we'd like to see partial masking of particularly sensitive data. We find the suite's user interface a bit sluggish at times, but that's not a serious problem. When you add it all up, Norton Internet Security is easily our Editors' Choice among security suites.

Dell's Multimedia Midrange PDA

There's plenty to love about the Dell Axim **X50**, one of the first Pocket PCs with Windows Media Plaver 10 built in. Not only does it transfer and play video better than any Pocket PC has before, it boasts a zippy 520-MHz processor and offers enterprise-friendly features like a CompactFlash card slot, Bluetooth connectivity, and Wi-Fi networking.

The X50 is also a lot betterlooking than previous Axims. This one is rounded with attractive black accents and a slightly velvety feel to the plastic sides. The X50 comes in three flavors: we tested the midrange model. The low-end X50 (\$299 direct) gives you a 416-MHz processor, half the 64MB of flash memory, and no 802.11b. The high-end X50v (\$499 direct) sports a 624-MHz processor, VGA screen, and 3-D graphics acceleration.

The 3.5-inch QVGA screen is crisp and bright. Watching video on your Pocket PC is finally enjoyable. MP3 and WMA files (both protected and unprotected) sounded

loud and clear through stereo headphones. But pack an extra battery for long trips. We got 4 hours 6 minutes of life on our typical-use test and 3:32 of runtime when playing video.

Benchmark test results for the X50 were somewhat uneven. It beat the 416-MHz HP iPAO rx3715 on CPU and graphics tests but fell slightly short on file system and applications tests. We didn't notice any prob-

lems in regular use, though, except for occasional pauses in video playback.

X50 gives you a faster processor, a CompactFlash slot, a more attractive case, and Media Play-

entry packs in a 1-megapixel camera, more memory, and better battery life. Both are very good PDAs, and for those who want good AV capabilities, the X50's built-in Media Player 10 sets it apart from the pack.

Archos Gmini 400

ant to make someone jealous? Sit down in a public place with an Archos Gmini 400 media player and fire up a movie, flip through digital photos, or play some games. The iPod-sized device packs a 20GB hard disk and a 2.2-inch, 320 by 240 pixel color screen sufficient to watch movies enjoyably. Want more? The Gmini is also a highquality audio player.

We've seen other personal

media players, most notably the Creative Labs and iRiver and Portable Media Center devices built on the Microsoft platform (First Looks, October 5), but none with the Gmini's combination of ease of use, battery life, and small size (5.5 ounces and 4.2 by 2.4 by 0.7 inches, HWD). The controls are sheer simplicity: power, a navigational rocker, a select button, and a back button.

Video files we saved to the device played smoothly, with very good color rendition. The Gmini 400 has audio and video out, so vou can connect it to a TV for a full-screen display of movies or a slide show. We played the videos on our 50inch rear-projection TV, and they looked surprisingly good, on a par with a VHS tape.

Audio performance from the



music, videos, and photos well.

Gmini was very good, with a slight, gradual dropoff of frequencies above 15 kHz and minimal harmonic distortion. The built-in audio recorder can record WAV files with excellent fidelity, up to 48 kHz, through either the line-in or microphone jacks.

When viewing photographs, we found colors bright and saturated, and sharpness very good (within the limits of the 320 by 240 pixel screen). And

the Gmini's battery life is surprisingly good. We watched an entire movie on a cross-country flight and still had plenty of battery left to listen to music the rest of the way.

Despite the obvious limitation of a 2.2-inch screen, the Gmini 400 is a very satisfying device.

usic player pioneer Rio Audio has introduced its first small hard drive player, the Rio Carbon, a 5GB player that's smaller and sleeker than the trend-setting 4GB Apple iPod mini.

The screen is readable and brightly backlit whenever you touch a control. And at a mere

3 ounces, the Carbon won't weigh you down. The fully rotating wheel in the upper-right corner is in some ways superior to the iPod's touch wheel, because you feel a click for each line on the menu or each increment in volume. Refreshingly,

Virtual Server Reduces Hardware Overhead

imed at midsize and large organizations, Microsoft Virtual Server 2005 Enterprise Edition (\$999 direct) is Redmond's latest version of the virtual PC technology it acquired from Connectix. With excellent administration capabilities and a no-fuss approach to setting up new virtual systems, this new release wins on several fronts as a tool that lets you do more with less hardware.

As far as Microsoft server products go, Virtual Server 2005 is a dream to install. It requires Windows Server 2003 (or Windows Small Business Server 2003). The setup utility creates an underlying virtual master server in a matter of minutes. The master server can drive multiple virtual machines, each one a Windows server with its own view of your hardware.

The Virtual Server administrative console is Web-based and highly functional. Its main page presents a quick status view of all running servers,

a thumbnail snap- Compag Status - Microsoft Inter shot of what's running on each virtual machine, and a graph of CPU usage. We would have liked wizards for policy configuration, as many users need hand-holding for that task. Another serious drawback is limited USB support in the VM and the lack of virtualization capabilities bevond the Microsoft software domain.

Installing a new operating system on each running virtual machine takes some effort, but if you do some planning, you need to do it only once. Virtual Server lets you clone servers quickly using disk images (called Virtual Hardware Disks, or VHDs). VHDs are easily the most immediately useful aspect of Virtual Server, as they allow admins to store and reuse operating system images flexibly. We used this feature to duplicate a Windows 2000 Server install

> in just a few seconds. Administrators will also enjoy the solid control of server resources, including the ability to control CPU bandwidth, memory usage, and disk space for each virtual machine.

Once your virtual servers are running, you observe what's happening on each virtual desktop by using the Virtual Machine Remote Control (VMRC). This tool lets you control a remote (or local) virtual server using your own keyboard and screen.

Of course, busy administrators usually do not have time to do everything by hand. An important feature in Virtual Server 2005 is its extensive COM-based API library for scripting. With over 40 objects and hundreds of methods to choose from, you can automate every aspect of VS 2005 in scripts or custom apps using most any COM-aware

programming language. Microsoft's Virtual Server

2005 Enterprise Edition does not aim to be a general-purpose solution to virtual clusters, but it will get many organizations thinking about ways to consolidate existing server hardware, especially on legacy applications, and reducing their IT costs.

JBuilder Brings More Power to Hard-Core Coders

Borland's latest version of its JBuilder Enterprise shines with support for late-breaking CHOICE Java standards, new tools for better security and performance, and a new focus on team development. This proven Java tool continues to impress, with enough power and polish for even the most demanding enterprise developers.

JBuilder runs on Microsoft Windows XP (tested here), Windows 2000/2003, Linux, Solaris, and Mac OS X. Beyond the core IDE, this version ships with a deployable version of Borland Enterprise Server 6.0,

plus hooks to other Bor-land products and Fortify, a security-auditing module. JBuilder continues to play well with others, supporting J2EE application servers from BEA and IBM, and open-source platforms like JBoss and Tomcat.


JBuilder 2005 continues Borland's tradition of polished and responsive IDEs that earn high marks for usability. As the product has grown in complexity, however, it does have a nit or two. For example, we found certain project properties hard to find and set. Yet the environment is still a good deal more approachable than IBM's Web-Sphere or the open-source Eclipse workbench. JBuilder remains a code-centered environment, and Borland makes no attempt to disguise that. BEA Workshop and Sun's Java Creator tools, which put friendlier interfaces on top of the codegenerating tools, are better for users with less coding expertise.

Notable Java code improvements in JBuilder 2005 include beefed-up support for refactoring, with a handful of wizards to automate changes to names and classes throughout projects. You can also annotate changes for distributed projects, so that other team members can see what's been changed and update their local code automati-

cally. This feature alone can make all the difference for projects built across different time zones. A new refactoring wizard that changes your code to the new IDK 1.5 standard is another welcome addition.

This release focuses on improving existing code as much as it does on creating new code. Besides running code audits for style, JBuilder 2005 integrates Fortify Software's securityanalysis tool. (An initial set of auditing rules comes free with JBuilder 2005. Updated rules cost \$499 per year.) We audited a variety of legacy applications-including an online store and travel application-and the

Fortify wizards made dozens of suggestions for improving our code. It even spotted a potentially troublesome "SQL injection" hack vulnerability in a Web-search form. Besides the standard—and still powerfulintegrated debugger, a standout improvement in this release is the ability to profile server-side code with the bundled OptimizeIt Server Trace tool. This addition means that for the first time, JBuilder Enterprise developers can check server-side code to spot performance bottlenecks. Microsoft Visual Studio .NET has had this feature for some time.

JBuilder 2005 also supports the emerging JavaServer Faces 1.1 (JSF) standard, a new way to create multitiered architecture. JSF splits off the presentation logic (JSPs) and the underlying business logic, so developers can build more scalable, more maintainable applications.

JSF is the designated successor to Struts, which was first with a widely embraced solution. It encourages a new style of building Web applications using XML tags instead of Java code. The JSF support in JBuilder 2005 is not as visual an experience as Sun's new Java Creator Tool, but it let us design with about a dozen controls automating the cutting and pasting of (often elaborate) custom XML tags that build JSF user interfaces. Other wizards build behind-the-scenes components that perform event handling in JSF. We used these new features to convert a handful of vanilla JSPs into JSF-compliant pages.

Borland also presents a powerful Enterprise JavaBeans design tool for getting control of behind-the-scenes database and business components. An improved Web-services browser lets you generate stub code quickly for interoperating with other servers. You can create your own Web services too, using additional wizards.

Overall, for any team moving code to new JSF or JDK 1.5 standards, JBuilder 2005 will likely be a must-have upgrade. For anyone else, this all-purpose Java IDE has a good deal to offer geographically distributed software development teams.

If you installed or used any version of Netscape SmartDownload software distributed before October 2000, or made available through the Internet a file that anyone downloaded (or tried to download) using such software, <u>please read this carefully as it may affect your legal rights</u>.

What is this Litigation about?

A proposed Settlement for three putative class actions is pending in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York (*Specht v. Netscape Communications Corp.*, Docket No. 00-CIV-4871 (AKH), and related cases). The putative class actions were filed against Netscape Communications Corp. and its parent America Online, Inc. The lawsuits alleged that Netscape SmartDownload software versions that preceded version 1.3 (which was released in October 2000) unlawfully intercepted users' and website operators' communications by transmitting to Netscape, during the course of a download, the URL address of the file being downloaded, along with a Key Code and a cookie. Netscape strenuously denies that the versions of SmartDownload at issue violated any law and believes that they were entirely lawful, effective, and valuable software that harmed no one.

What is this Settlement about?

This Notice is only a summary. You should read the Official Notice, which more fully describes the terms of the Settlement. It is available at www.SmartDownloadSettlement.com or by e-mail at SmartDocs@abbeygardy.com.

Under the proposed Settlement, Netscape will agree to (1) continue to refrain from distributing the versions of SmartDownload at issue in the suits, (2) continue to avoid recording any URL or Key Code data sent to it by those older versions, (3) delete URL or Key Code data that it still has that was previously sent by those older versions, (4) not distribute Netscape software that it knows will "intercept" users' Internet communications in violation of the law at issue in the suits, and (5) cause an outside contractor to periodically review and report to Netscape's senior management whether its current software has functions similar to the function at issue in the suits. No money will be paid to any Settlement Class Members under the proposed Settlement.

Heavy-Duty Speed, in Color

ven a casual glance at the copier-sized, 205-pound Ricoh Aficio CL7100D will tell you that it's a heavy-duty printer. The engine in this floor-standing color laser is rated at 35 pages per minute (ppm) for both monochrome and color, with a 200,000page-per-month duty cycle. Office-friendly paper-handling features include a duplexer and 1,100-sheet paper capacity, with options to boost capacity to 3,100 sheets with the add-on 2,000-sheet paper drawer (\$1,245 list). You can also add a stacker with a stapler (\$3,100 list) or a booklet maker to fold. staple, and stack (\$3,400 list), with a two- and three-hole punch option (\$765 list) available for either.

If the heavy-duty paper handing doesn't impress you, the speed and output quality will. On our business-applications



SPEED AND PRICE make the CL7100D worth a look.

suite (using QualityLogic's hardware and software, www .qualitylogic.com), the CL7100D handed in a total time of 6 minutes 40 seconds—faster than most monochrome lasers. Bottom line: The CL7100D is certainly the fastest color printer we've seen for this price.

The printer's output quality is also among the best we've seen. More than half the

fonts we test were easily readable at 4 points, and all were easily readable at 8 points. Graphics were marred by some mild dithering. Photos suffered from a visible tint, particularly for black-and-white output. The printer has a color-calibration feature, but we found it tiresome to use, and it didn't always improve the output.

Very much in the CL7100D's favor is that Ricoh says it works with the widely used HP Web Jetadmin remote printer-administration software. Also worth mentioning is its low claimed cost per page, 1.1 cents for monochrome pages and 7.7 cents for color.

Pros: Compact size. Nearexcellent text quality. Cons: Maximum 250-sheet input capacity.

Bottom line: The HP LaserJet 1160 takes up relatively little desk space, and it offers near-excellent text quality and surprisingly good photo quality for a monochrome laser. Performance is less than impressive, but still acceptable.

Top-Notch 19-Inch Monitor

The image quality from the 19-inch **Princeton** SENergy 914 is excellent, and the price (\$625 street) is low, considering all you get.

The six chrome buttons along the bottom edge of the screen are clearly marked with lightgray legends that are easy to read. The buttons include a source-select control that lets you choose between the three signal inputs-two analog and one digital-and give quick access to gamma presets and backlight brightness.

In our tests with DisplayMate (www.displaymate.com), the SENergy 914's image quality was generally excellent. With an analog signal, the autosync feature worked flawlessly. A handy feature automatically sets the brightness and contrast based

on the screen's contents, but we found that it took some additional tweaks for optimum performance. We quickly reached settings with top-notch performance in both the dark and light extremes of the gray range.

The 914's uniformity



THE SENERGY 914 delivers fine image quality at a good price.

was very good, and viewing angle performance was better than average. We saw a loss of color saturation at about 45 degrees off-axis, but no gross color changes. We found no apparent pixel defects, and color ramps were smooth. The only flaw was faint ghosting with an

analog signal. We also noticed moderate smearing of moving images, which is to be expected from an LCD panel with a 25-ms pixel-response time.

The SENergy 914 is not the perfect monitor, but it delivers where it counts the most: image quality. Priced at a level that competes with premium 17-inch LCD monitors, it represents a good value.







LET 'ER RIP!

I just finished reading Bill Howard's "Rent, Don't Rip" column (October 19, page 71), and I do not agree with his money-saving tips.

He says that buying 100 CDs will cost \$1,500 and that money would be better used renting music from online music stores. Although I agree that the

\$1,500 would probably cover downloads I make from online music stores for a decade, what about the hardware needed to play the music? If you do not already own an MP3 player, then you will have to shell out anywhere from \$100 to \$300 for a portable device. And what about the devices he mentions for the car? The prices I see for a PhatNoise jukebox kit for a car range from \$300 to \$400 depending on the size of the hard drive. And then there's installation.

If I didn't own a portable player or a car player, I would be looking at \$400 to \$700 up front just for the hardware. And what happens when I fill up that player and need a new one with a bigger hard drive?

Existing CDs may not make sense to Mr. Howard, but I already have lots of them and I already own the hardware necessary to play them in my home, at work, and in my car. And I don't have to deal with the added time required to transfer them between devices.

to rent music.

They love the renting concept because it means that they can create further impediments to fair use. Is there another industry that is as hostile to its customers?

DVD-Authoring Redux

fter receiving more than 100 letters from *PC Magazine* readers, I can only conclude that DVD authoring on PCs is a mess. I can't recall another product category or application with such a huge spread of user experiences—from total failure to shining success—with so many partial victories scattered in between. Now that the e-mail deluge has finally ceased, I'm sorting through the suggestions, other than "Buy a Mac," to see what I should do next. Not that I have anything against Apple; I'm just not going to switch platforms to do something that is being done (by some) on PCs.

But it's also apparent from the letters that PC performance matters. Evidently, the software is not sophisticated enough to keep everything in sync if it encounters some hardware slowdowns. Most packages I've looked at recommend working on a machine with a l-GHz processor and 128MB RAM, or with 2 GHz and 256MB for real-time preview, but 2 GHz and 512MB will probably get you more reliable results.

Disk performance matters too. One reader, ira_e, wrote, "...several DVDs authored with Sonic MyDVD (bundled with my Sony DRU-500A) had out-of-sync soundtracks. [Someone] suggested defragmenting the hard drive before burning. That worked. Why should that matter in a digital world?"

Good question. Video timing is tricky enough, and the computer is already reading the video and audio tracks, assembling your edits, converting formats, applying filters, and streaming the output. The additional latency imposed by a fragmented hard drive may be all that's needed to throw it into chaos.

Ira_e also mentioned that it took him days to edit a disc with 25 chapters in Pinnacle Studio 8, because the program had trouble staying up with that much material. He added that Pinnacle Liquid Edition was "pretty much the only program [he's] used that can lock up a Windows XP machine with consistency."

Joe Steffen passed along a finding from *Videomaker* magazine saying that DVD-R (which I'd been using) has more compatibility problems than +R. He also found that some +RW discs from TDK and Memorex ceased to function in some of his players, but Verbatim discs worked consistently. Sheesh, the last time anybody worried about media compatibility was over 20 years ago—with floppy disks.

Not to argue with ira_e, but reader William Howard (no relation to our columnist) found that

Pinnacle Studio 8 was a key player among three critical purchases. The other two were a 3-GHz machine with IGB RAM and a Memorex internal dual-format 8X DVD burner. Again, the total hardware and software package figures in your success.

Several other readers had a love-hate thing with Pinnacle Studio 8; some moved up to Pinnacle Studio 9 and said it was much better. Michael Koo recommended WinDVD Creator 2 over Pinnacle Studio 8, although he admitted that it has menu-button limitations and that you have to override some of its defaults for DVD-player (not computer) compatibility.

Several readers recommended DVD-lab. One, Tom Cantarine, abandoned his suite of Adobe products for DVD-lab but noted that you have to prerender all of your video in MPEG-2 before you can use it. Sigh.

Ulead DVD Workshop 2 was praised by a number of readers. I've got a copy, and I'll definitely be trying it. One user, Ben Franske, said that it is leaps and bounds better than Ulead DVD Movie Factory, and he stated that the vast majority of the bundled programs are useless when it comes to creating menus. Some people manage to make them work, however: Conrad Brimhall has used both Ulead DVD Movie Factory SE and Roxio Easy Media Creator 7 to create chaptered DVDs. He was another user who found better compatibility with +R discs.


In fact, I found opposing opinions on just about every software package. Nero 6, for instance, garnered high praise from a number of readers. Marvin Wood said it wasn't the most intuitive but worked well. Dirk Swanson, however, said it worked okay but ran slowly and crashed often. Swanson is now using TMPGEnc DVD Author 2.5 and saying, "It's not perfect, but it's the best I've tried."

Christian Super is another TMPGEnc DVD Author 2.5 user, but he cautions, "This is still not for the faint of heart." He started with Sony's Screenblast, didn't like it, tried Nero 6, felt the video editor was weak, then tried Roxio Easy Media Creator 7. Now he uses Roxio to capture and edit, TMPGEnc to author, and Roxio to burn.

Multiple software products are the hallmark of many successful DVD creators. They are also the sign of a market segment in serious trouble.



Wi-Fi Nightmares

f all the technologies that need to settle down, 802.11 wireless in all its manifestations ("a," "b," "g," and—coming soon—"n") should be at the top of the list. There is a mad rush to make the standards for 802.11—used mostly to share crummy 1-Mbps Internet connections—move forward at breakneck speed. At this point, do we really need 802.11n, which proposes speeds between 100 and 540 Mbps using four radios running at once?

A number of companies are already proposing to ship cards and routers dubbed 802.11 pre-n. The Wi-Fi trademark body has threatened to pull the license for any company that uses the "n" moniker before the standard is set, because of the fiasco over 802.11g products that shipped prematurely and became incompatible when the standard was finalized. Now we are seeing this ridiculous pre-n craziness.

This is particularly galling to watch, since even the vanilla 802.11b standard doesn't seem quite done yet. By that I mean the ever-changing encryption modes. First there was some sort of simple key, then along came WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) encryption, and now there's WPA (Wi-Fi Protected Access)— while the experts say that "tunneling" via a VPN is the best bet. Meanwhile, everyone seems to be ignoring encryption. And when someone misuses it, everyone gets messed up.

Recently, I went to an event where wireless connectivity had supposedly been set up by an expert. Actually some IT guy back at the home office thought he was doing everyone a favor by making the wireless network tight as a drum. This temporary lash-up was to be used by a very few people for three lousy days. So what does he do? He configures it using WPA. While this may look good on paper, nobody had a laptop or device to support it—so nobody got on the wireless network, except one guy with a brand-new laptop that coincidentally had WPA installed. It's incredibly annoying when people make this sort of blunder. What's the point of so much security? There was no network of document-laden computers with confidential information to protect, just a connection to the Internet. It's mind-boggling.

But what do the IT guys know? Just what they are told. If you go to the Wi-Fi Web site (*www.wi-fi.org*), you'll see that WPA2 is now being promoted! What? WPA itself is already broken?

That said, it's been determined over and over that

the biggest threat to your network comes from the people inside the company. And the biggest joke about 802.11 is that nobody uses any of these encryption schemes (except when they should not be used) anyway. I can drive into any city, park my car on any downtown street, and pick up dozens of networks. Maybe a quarter are secured; the rest are wide open.

What is the reason for this? Technology tends to be so disappointing and buggy that when something works at all, nobody wants to mess with it let alone get fancy. When any 802.11 system gets up and running right, the last thing anyone wants to do is change the settings. Too risky. Most of these networks don't even bother to change the name of the router. It's usually "default" or "Linksys" or "D-Link," the way it came from the factory. It is kind of pathetic.

Things get worse with the confusion created by the industry itself. Look at all the 802.11 initiatives. First there is "b", which came before "a", which was supplanted by "g", because "g" uses the same radio as "b" rather than a new one in "a". "A" is faster than "b", and "g" is the same speed as "a" but runs on a different frequency. "B" and "g" run on the 2.4 wallpenetrating junk frequency and "a" runs in various bands between 5.15 GHz and 5.825 GHz. Pant, pant.


Now here comes 802.11n. Agh. And where are the rest of the letters? 802.11c, 802.11d, and so forth? To further confuse the public, the actual 802.11-whatever refers to a working group, not any sort of branding continuum that would make sense. For example, 802.11c sets the standard for network bridging. And 802.11d is even more off track, since it's a group working on wireless global harmonization.

This is essentially a black hole of confusion, similar to the one created for the old modem market with all its names for various speeds and protocols. I don't even want to get into a discussion about how many of these supposedly compatible Wi-Fi systems do not work well together when you mix brands, despite what we are told.

I love the idea of moving around the world wirelessly. But if I had a choice between going wireless and plugging into an RJ-45, I'd take the RJ-45 with the hard wire anytime. It just works. It's faster and better.

Inside Track

Ye been reading about and following the emergence of VoIP (Voice over IP) services since their inception and have also seen various voice-over-the-Internet initiatives come and go. The investment in those expensive old phone switches and the desire of phone companies to keep them running are the biggest of many roadblocks to the full implementation of VoIP. If you wonder why DSL services have **often deteriorated**, it is because good DSL invites VoIP. Bad DSL, on the contrary, keeps it at bay. This, to me, explains the fact that cable modems have continued to hold and even gain in market share.

If you read the literature, you will see that **concerns over FCC regulations** regarding the linking of VoIP to the PSTN (public switched telephone network) are also keeping VoIP from moving quickly. Maybe it's time to set up a second tier of services that has nothing to do with the PSTN. If you want to call someone on a PSTN system, then **use a cell phone.** If computer users all agreed on a set standard for PC/Internet-based phone services, most of us could easily connect for free, especially if **qualityof-service** protocols were implemented. Just a thought.

Much of the concern always centers around the **911 red herring.** When I was a kid, there was no 911 service. We called the cops directly. For other kinds of emergencies, we'd dial zero (even easier than 911) and tell the operator to get an ambulance or whatever was required. Somewhere along the way, the operators started earning too much money and had to be downsized. Now they're in Bangalore. I'd love to look into the history of 911 services, because I suspect they were implemented to save money, not as a real public service.


Have you ever used 911? They **foul up** all the time. The system is not effective for many emergencies. I would much rather call a smart local operator, but they are all gone. Now 911 is a convenient foil to ward off VoIP. Also, you will note that there wasn't much of a complaint during the mobile phone revolution about 911 until VoIP began to emerge as a threat to the phone companies. They had to shore up their defenses by making sure that cell phones had some sort of 911 capability, although they had been operating cellular services without it for years and years. Agh.

Meanwhile, a number of schemes have sprung up related to 802.11e, which is the quality-of-service working group that should find a way to **enable voice communications** over 802.11a/b/g networks. This will be interesting, especially in venues such as hotels in which 802.11 networks are now being

installed helter-skelter.

Over the years, hotels have seen their profit margins from telecommunications services fall because of cell phones. **Nobody in their right mind** would use the phone in a hotel room anymore, because the hotels are **gouging their customers** on phone use. This is a trend that began about 15 or 20 years ago. A simple call to say hello to the family could run you \$25.

And while we're on the subject of connectivity, apparently the FCC is looking into all of the various plans to hook the power grid into the Internet. This technology is at the point where it almost works well enough to be seriously considered. The end result will be the talking washing machine. Just what we need!

The fact that the FCC is looking at the technology, though, means **something is brewing.** Keep an eye on it.

Genuinely Interesting Software Dept.: While IBM finally showed off its multiyear effort to offer big high-end storage systems—the DS6000 and DS8000—to compete with EMC, it may be going in the **wrong direction.** That said, these devices are very cool, and they are amazingly small. About the size of a VCR, the drive subsystems can be scaled to **67.2 terabytes.**

But the kicker to all of this is the fact that IBM is now discussing the **virtualization of storage** across many systems. This was once called distributed storage, and then SANs (storage area networks). It's now called virtual storage systems. This is a concept that has now been talked up for almost a decade

Overlooked in all of this is a \$199 low-end software solution for small and medium-size businesses that can do all of the newfangled conceptual/virtualization SAN stuff for a lot **cheaper** and with equivalent or better performance. The company that makes the software is called DataCore and it has gotten ex-IBM superstars involved with its system. So before you start throwing your money away on some of those ridiculously overpriced subsystems, take a look at these folks. Go to *www.datacore.com* to find out more. Hot stuff.

While we are on the subject of terabytes, we can expect to have terabyte hard drives on our desktops in about two years. Meanwhile, companies have not given up on nonmagnetic media: A **holographic recording** technology is expected to work within the next few years, delivering a 1-terabyte optical disc. That will be just in time for you to store those 100MB RAW photo files that are headed your way. It just never ends.

Backup Systems Don't Get No Respect

n any Rodney Dangerfield memorial survey to rank PC hardware, backup systems would get the least respect (excepting power protection). They are capital-B boring, at least until you trash a couple files, or a complete hard disk, at which point they become important (but still boring). It has been years since I've lost a file, and part of that is luck. The other part is preparation: having the right backup hardware and software to ensure files are safe.

For several years I've been a fan of network hard disks, essentially headless (no monitor) shoeboxes containing a hard disk, power supply, Linux, and an Ethernet adapter. You can quickly copy files to them. For home users they make a great central repository for photos, music, and digitized videos that you want to play elsewhere in the house. Buffalo Technology, D-Link, Iomega, Linksys, and Ximeta make them. Buffalo's LinkStation Network Storage Center is the best because in technology that isn't cutting edge, price plays a major role, and Buffalo is cheap at about \$260 for the 120GB version. It functions as a USB print server and lets you attach an external USB drive for more storage. With most network hard disks you have to add your own backup software to automate the process, which is important since it's something users often forget.

Even cheaper are USB or FireWire external hard disks, but they can back up only one PC at a time. Some have backup software; some don't. I like the Maxtor OneTouch II now that the complex Dantz Retrospect backup software has been upgraded. There are also solid products from Iomega, LaCie (FireWire only) Seagate, Western Digital, and WiebeTech. If you're really cost conscious, you can buy a USB hard drive enclosure for \$50 and add your own 120GB to 200GB hard disk for \$100. Or you could put a second hard disk in each PC.

Recently, I've become a fan of the Mirra Personal Server. It took a year to warm up to Mirra because it seemed to be an overly expensive backups-only SOHO/departmental device, meaning you couldn't use it as a central repository for photos or music that you could share with, say, the digital media hub in the living room. In fact, applications can't directly access the contents of the disk except through Mirra's software. So \$400 seemed an awful lot for an 80GB drive and backup software. But there are enough features in version 2.0 to justify the price, which is about \$500 street for 120GB and \$750 for 250GB. It makes continuous background backups off all the networked PCs in your home or office. Now you can access and share files online, make backups of your laptop back to the server from a broadband-equipped hotel, synchronize folders among multiple PCs, keep multiple versions of files, and share photos online. Small businesses can share files with clients.

These features help you forget that the Mirra costs twice as much as a desktop PC with the same drive capacity. But your time has value; if it's \$40 to \$50 an hour and Mirra halves the time spent finding lost files, deleted files, or uninfected previous versions, in a year you've probably saved back the cost of the device.

All these solutions have a downside: The devices share the same building as the original data and are vulnerable to flood, fire, earthquake, or theft. So you still need to keep your most crucial data offsite. For most users this entails a combination of DVD-R backups stored in the office or safe deposit box, possibly online backup (your ISP typically offers a couple gigabytes), and certainly—for notebook users or presenters—a USB key that carries the data you use right now.

I've adopted overlapping forms of backup: More than necessary for an average month, just enough for a month when a natural disaster might strike. Now that I'm comfortable with Mirra, it's our family's main form of backup and it's the one that bails us out of common jams. A second copy (the only freely accessible network copy) of the music, photo, and video files is on a network hard disk, as are all the data files. But they're all in the same building, so monthly DVD backups go in the safe deposit box, and the files are also on my laptop. I keep presentations I'm giving on a USB key in my pocket in case the laptop fails. I will admit to one piece of Type A behavior: I keep a creaky old network hard disk in a detached shed that has (this is not normal, I admit) a wired Ethernet connection. You could do that if you have a detached garage (and a spare UPS). It's better to be lucky and prepared, if boring, than merely lucky, because luck won't last forever. Though backups may not get no respect, they can be a godsend when things go wrong.



MAKING TECHNOLOGY WORK FOR YOU

Video Editing 101

Turn your home video into a crowd-pleasing movie. BY JAN OZER

hile most of us feel comfortable shooting with a camcorder, fear of actually editing the video is so rampant that it deserves an official medical designation, like timeline-aphobia or transitionitis. In years past, when working with analog formats (for example, 8-mm, Hi8, and VHS-C), underpowered computers, and minimal hard disk space, this apprehension was probably justified.

Today, though, if you own a DV camcorder and late-model Windows XP computer, you'll find video editing surprisingly accessible. With the holiday season looming (and perhaps summer videos waiting to be edited), there's never been a better time to take the plunge. So take a deep breath, visualize success, and follow along with our introduction to video editing.

We'll be working with a home video of a birthday party highlighted by a visit from a clown. While the edits are specific to this project, the techniques should work for most home videos.

We're going to demonstrate the techniques using Microsoft's Movie Maker 2.1 for Windows XP because it's freely available to all Windows XP users. Other programs for editing digital video that have higher-end features than Movie Maker 2.1 are available. For our review of two of the

best consumer products, Adobe Premiere Elements and Pinnacle Studio Pro 9, see "Video-Editing Power for Non-Pros," (http://go.pcmag.com/nonproediting). For newcomers, though, Movie Maker is a good place to start.

This latest version of Movie Maker is

preview your movie in the Monitor, which is on the top right.

On the bottom is the Storyboard, where you'll drag and sequence the clips in your project. As we'll see below, this window converts to a Timeline used to finalize your videos.

CAPTURE YOUR VIDEO

The first step in most productions is capture, in which you transfer video from a DV camcorder to a computer. This occurs over a FireWire connection, officially called IEEE-1394. All DV cameras have a FireWire port, so you'll need a FireWire

available only as a component of Windows XP Service Pack 2; if you've downloaded SP2, you should have Movie Maker 2.1. Go to your *Start* menu and select *All Programs*, then *Accessories and Enter*-

tainment. You can learn more about Version 2.1 and how to start the SP2 download process at www.microsoft .com/moviemaker.

Figure 1 shows the Movie Maker interface. On the top left is the Tasks pane, where you'll initiate most production tasks. In the top middle is the Collections pane, which houses captured and imported content as well as Movie Maker's collections of transitions and special effects. You'll port or card in your computer and a FireWire cable.

To begin, click on *Capture from video device* in the Tasks pane. This starts a wizard that includes several straightforward decisions, like naming the captured files and identifying where to store them. When you get to the *Video Setting* screen, choose DV-AVI (Figure 2). Even if you don't plan on sending the video back out to your DV camera, capturing in DV format ensures the highest possible output quality.

You can direct Movie Maker to capture the entire tape automatically or manually capture scenes from the tape via the screen (as shown in Figure 3). Use the 74 OFFICE: Web design with Publisher.

controls beneath the video window to queue the camcorder to the desired clips, then start and stop capture with the buttons on the upper left.

In both of these instances, click on the *Create clips when wizard finishes* check box. This creates a separate clip for each time you stopped and started the camcorder during shooting, which makes it easier to identify clips you want to include in the production.




FIGURE 5: Transitions help you link the different scenes together smoothly.

ORGANIZE YOUR CLIPS

Movie Maker creates a new collection for all captured clips. Double-click on any clip to play it in the Monitor. If it contains a scene you'd like to include in the movie label, label it by clicking on F2 and typing the new name. Otherwise, press the Delete key to send it to the cutting-room floor. Then start dragging your keeper clips to the Storyboard.

Movie Maker 2 is nonlinear, which means you can sequence clips any way you'd like, irrespective of when you actually shot them. Thus, you

can drag clips to the Storyboard in any order and move them around within the Storyboard like checkers on a checkerboard.

After sequencing the clips in the Storyboard, switch to the Timeline view by clicking on *Show Timeline* above the Storyboard. Where the Storyboard shows only a single frame from each clip, the Timeline displays

> both the video and audio components, and three

other tracks (discussed below) that we'll use to polish our videos (Figure 4).

First, you should trim away any excess frames from your clips. Position your pointer over the edge of a clip to display the trim cursor that is shown in Figure 4. Click and drag the edge of the video until the desired start frame (when trimming the beginning of the clip) or end frame (when trimming the end) appears in the Monitor. When you release the mouse, Movie Maker sets the new trim point.

POLISH YOUR PRODUCTION

Now let's polish our production, starting with transitions. Transitions are effects that help smooth the flow from one clip to another. Common transitions include a *dissolve*, where the first clip blends with the second before the second clip fully appears, and a *fade to black*, where the first clip slowly fades to black and the second clip fades from black.

You don't have to use a transition between all clips on the Timeline; you can simply *cut* from clip to clip. Try building your movie without transitions at first and see how it flows. Generally, you should insert a transition only when you need to give the viewer a clue that something has *changed* between the two clips, usually ei-

> ther the time frame or the scene location. For example, if the party moves from the playroom to the dining room, a simple dissolve helps smooth the flow.

> Movie Maker stores all transitions in a collection just like your captured videos. To display Movie Maker's transitions, choose *Transitions* in the *Collections* list box (Figure 5). Insert a transition by dragging it down between the two clips.

ADD BACKGROUND MUSIC

Beneath the Audio track is the Audio/ Music track, where you can insert either narration or background music. The latter in particular is a great way to improve the watchability of your movies.

For example, in the scenes before the clown's performance, there is no real dia-




FIGURE 6: You can create titles and credits from the Enter text for title screen.

logue to carry the scene. We're simply showing the decorations and food that Momma prepared and documenting who showed up at the party. Adding party music makes the scene look like a music video, which is much more fun to watch.

Import audio by clicking on *Import audio or music* in the Tasks pane. Then, drag the audio file down to the Audio/ Music track. If necessary, adjust volume on either the Audio or Audio/Music tracks by right-clicking and selecting *Volume*. Movie Maker can import a wide range of formats, including MP3, WAV, and WMA, but it cannot import a file that's copy-protected.

The bottom track is the Title Overlay track, where you add text titles to your videos. Insert a title at the beginning of the movie to identify the event, periodically through the movie to let the viewer know the story is moving along, and add closing credits at the end to identify the stars of the production.

To create a title, click on *Make titles or credits* in the Tasks pane, which opens the *Enter text for title* screen shown in Figure 6. You can experiment with different title an-

imations and change the text font and color by clicking the respective links beneath the text entry screen.

SPECIAL EFFECTS

Movie Maker also offers 53 effects, which

you access by clicking on the *Collections* list box and then selecting *Video Effects*. The most important of them are the Fade In effect, which fades your movie in from black, and Fade Out, which fades your movie to black. Apply all effects by dragging and dropping them atop the target clip.

In addition, Movie Maker offers basic effects to correct under- or overexposed video; vastly more sophisticated tools, however, are available from Pixélan Software (*http:* //www.pixelan.com/mm/intro .htm). Beyond correcting problems with the underlying video, the use of special effects is a matter of taste. It's best to build your

movie without them and add effects only when necessary to achieve a desired look.

YOUR PICTURES OUGHTA BE IN PICTURES

Movie Maker can also import digital still pictures, whether scanned or from a digital camera, and build a video slide show. Click on *Import pictures* in the Tasks pane to import your digital photos, which you can drag to any length on the Timeline. You can zoom into or away from the pictures using the Ease In and Ease Out effects, or purchase more sophisticated pan and zoom capabilities from Pixélan and elsewhere. (See my review of slide-show creation products, including ArcSoft DVD SlideShow 1.0, our Editors' Choice, at http://go.pcmag.com/ slideshowcreation.)

One great Movie Maker feature is AutoMovie, which converts your clips into a music video–like production. To start, select your clips in the Collections pane, then click on *Make an AutoMovie* in the Tasks pane.

Choose an Editing Style that will deliver the desired feel and tempo for the video (Figure 7), then enter a title for the movie and select a background music track. Movie Maker will scan through the video file, identify the best segments, and synchronize them to the background music. When you have finished editing, click on one of the five output destinations in the Finish Movie section of the Task Bar, then follow the wizard to render


FIGURE 8: Saving the video in DV-AVI format will permit you to burn it to DVD.

your final file.

Note that Movie Maker can't author DVDs. To produce a video file to input into a third-party DVD authoring program like MyDVD, click on *Save to my computer*, and output the file in DV-AVI format. As shown in Figure 8, you'll find this option in the *Other settings* list box in the Movie Setting screen.

Beyond these technical details, our best advice to you is to keep the movie, and all of the clips in it, as short as possible. Less is more when it comes to home video, and shorter is almost always better.

Quick and Easy Web Sites with Publisher

Microsoft Publisher is a handy tool for creating a small site.

hen you're looking for software to help you build a Web site, don't overlook Publisher 2003. Publisher is capable of more than printing newsletters, calendars, and paper airplanes. While it's not in the same league as Dreamweaver or even FrontPage, Publisher is a useful Web site design tool, particularly when you need only a small site.


If you already use a Publisher design set for your publications, you can use the same design for your Web site so you maintain consistency across all publications. Moreover, if you're not an experienced designer, the Publisher pages look good and get you up and running very quickly with a site that looks professional and requires a lot less work than other programs.

When creating a site in Publisher, you can design it yourself or use a preset structure. Go to *File* | *New;* the presets are under the *Web sites and e-mail* heading on the Task pane. The three-page site gives you a home page, as well as About Us and Contact Us pages, and the Easy Web Site Builder lets you choose from a range of different page types depending on your site's goals.

The Product Sales structure adds a main product list page with details pages to the basic three-page site, and Professional Services adds services and service details

pages as well as a project list to the basic site. You can easily add to any of the site options by choosing *Insert* | *Page* and selecting a page from the list.

This technique is useful for working around a shortcoming of the Professional Services site: The final page in the Professional Services site is a Project page with links to details pages but no actual pages. While you

can't insert the individual details pages (because curiously, there aren't any), you can delete the Project page and add a new Project page with its ancillary details pages using Insert | Page | Project List with links.

Instead of using a template, you can build a site from scratch by going to *File* | *New* | *Blank Web page*. When you do, configure the page size so your site is constrained to fixed dimensions by choosing *File* | *Page Setup*. Select *Web page* as the Publication type and then one of the preset page sizes, or create your own. Even if you're building from scratch, you can still use the many design, color, and font schemes if you want. Even better, there's lots of functionality you can add—to dis-

play products, for example, or to provide links to other pages.

Providing a means for visitors to move around your site is crucial. Publisher has good navigation tools; they just take getting used to. Preset sites have navigation bars included automatically. You can configure this bar by clicking on it and choosing *Format* | *Navigation bar properties* from the menu. Here you can add or remove pages from the Navigation struc-

ture, reorder the links, and even add links to external sites. If you simply want to rename a link, you can do this by editing it directly on the page.

If you create a site from scratch, add navigation bars by choosing *Insert* | *Navigation Bar* | *New*. You can also use this option to add a duplicate set of navigation links to any site—for example, to add text navigation at the foot of the pages. Each navigation bar works inde-

pendently of the others, so you'll need to configure and update them separately.

The Navigation bar tool can also be used to create navigation bars that appear within certain sections of your site. In this case, choose the bar type, click on *Insert Object*, and select the *Insert on this page only* option. Once it's in place, you can add and remove links to other pages as required. To add this or any other navigation bar to another page choose *Insert* | *Navigation Bar* | *Existing* and click on the one to use.

Including titles, descriptions, and keywords with your pages can produce better listings for your site in some search engines. To add these to a page, choose *Tools* | *Web Page Options*, and type a new title in the Page title area. This adds a page title and doesn't affect its name in the navigation links. Here you can also type the page description and keywords up to a maximum of 256 characters for each.

When completed, save your site as a Publisher file so you can edit it again later, then publish it to the Web. The new incremental publish feature lets you upload only pages that have altered since you last uploaded them.



Picture Peril

Specially crafted JPEGs can run malicious code on unprotected systems. BY JAY MUNRO

f you never thought a picture could hurt you, think again. A recent Microsoft security bulletin details a critical Windows vulnerability that enables a malicious IPEG to download and execute a Trojan on a victim's system as soon as the victim views the image. If you run Windows XP Service Pack 2, you're protected. And a firewall that blocks outgoing requests (not the Windows XP firewall) may also block the download of Trojan code. But millions of other users are vulnerable to this new avenue of attack.

As we went to print, there were still no worms that use the vulnerability, but security experts feel that it's only a matter of time. For worm authors, the vulnerability may be the holy grail of infection vectors, since it can be passed through e-mail, Web sites, IM, or downloaded programs. Moreover, many kinds of applications and OS versions can view JPEGS, offering innumerable paths for the malicious files to spread. A worm with this kind of infection power could make the August 2003 Blaster

The first truly malicious version of the JPEG exploit showed up as a pornographic image on a newsgroup. Usenet newsgroup service Easynews.com posted an alert (http://easynews.com/virus .html), claiming it had found several JPEG images that, when viewed, will download a Trojan via an external FTP site. The images were found under the user name "Power-Post 2000." The alert says that the Trojan is downloaded and executed, but currently the code does not propagate, infecting only the machine the JPEG is viewed on. The Trojan, however, could allow the victim's machine to be controlled remotely, possibly for propagation

cute the code even if the JPEG is named .BMP or .TIF. Interestingly, the comments both suggest that a more dangerous worm may be on the way and also encourage "everyone out there to download SP2, patch your Windows systems, etc. Of course this won't be a cure all

solution :-/." As if the posting of this source code isn't bad enough, security company iDefense reports that a utility (JPGDown.A) is available that makes it easy for anyone to download a hostile JPEG file and then distribute it to vulnerable computers. According to IDefense, if the JPEG is viewed on an unpatched system, it will "initiate a download of a remote file as configured by the attacker and execute it."

AOL BEEFS UP SECURITY

AOL is offering its customers a new premium service. PassCode is a two-factor authentication system based on RSA Security's SecureID, which uses a keychain-size device that generates a simple, six-digit code that changes every 60 seconds. When logging on to AOL, users will first be prompted for their passwords; this is the first factor. The second factor is the six-digit RSA code. Only if both factors are validated by the system is the user granted access.

PassCode is available to AOL members for a one-time cost of \$9.95 for each PassCode device plus an additional \$1.95 to \$4.95 per month, depending on the number of screen names that are secured to the device.-Sharon Terdeman

flow flaw in the JPEG parsing engine contained in the file GDIPlus.DLL, a file that is used by the operating system and a great many applications. The JPEG specification allows the embedding of comments in a JPEG file. A two-byte value is supposed to indicate the length of the comments, but if an illegal value is inserted, a buffer overflow condition ensues that overwrites memory structures and potentially allows an attacker to run arbitrary code on the affected system.

Windows systems that have applied the MS04-028 security patches listed at www .microsoft.com/technet/security/bulletin/ ms04-028.mspx or the Windows XP Service Pack 2 are not vulnerable to the current crop of exploiting JPEGs. In addition, the current JPEG-exploiting files have a unique signature that antivirus vendors can detect. Antivirus products must be set to scan all files, however.

This flaw affects a wide range of Microsoft products, such as the popular Office 2003, and each must have its individual patch applied. This can be done through Windows Update or manually from the MS04-028 bulletin page (www.microsoft .com/security/bulletins/200409_jpeg .mspx). For users with products other than Windows XP or Office 2003, Microsoft is offering a tool that scans your hard drive for vulnerable software.

You know the drill: Get patched, make sure your antivirus software is up-to-date, and watch what you download!



Closing a Hole in OE Identity Protection

The article "Password-Protect the Outlook Express In-Box" (*http://go.pcmag* .com/oepass) says "When you log off in this way [using OE's Identities feature], nobody can launch OE without supplying the password." But that's not true if the person logs onto Microsoft Windows as a different user or even as a guest, at least in Windows 98 and Me. The Identity Password dialog in Microsoft Outlook Express will be skipped, and you can see all in-boxes.

Microsoft Knowledge Base article 258194 explains how to get around this. You must launch *Passwords* from Control Panel, click on the *User Profiles* tab, and check the box that says each user can customize settings. This way each user will have a different profile and won't have access to your e-mail.

This problem is specific to the Windows 9*x* family (Windows 95/98/Me); the Windows NT family doesn't provide an option to have all users share the same settings. If you are using a 9*x* version of Windows, changing your settings so that each user has a different profile may not be sufficient because the no-user "guest" profile (invoked by clicking on *Cancel* in the log-on dialog) may already have access to your main e-mail. The problem may exist even if you already set the system to use a separate profile for each user. Here's how to check and correct that situation.

Log off Windows, wait for the log-on dialog to appear, and click on the *Cancel* button. When the system finishes booting, launch Outlook Express. If it asks you to create an e-mail account, that means there is no problem, so just cancel, close OE, and log off. On the other hand, if OE displays your existing e-mail account, you have a problem.

Select *File* | *Identities* | *Add New Identity* from the menu. Give the new identity a name, but don't fill in any other information. When it asks if you want to switch to the new identity, click on *Yes*. When OE prompts you for account information, just click on *Cancel*.

OE may offer to import an existing account, but again cancel this. Select *File* | *Identities* | *Manage Identities* from the menu. Highlight your main identity and click on *Remove*. This will remove access only to the identity from the "guest" log-on. It won't affect the way you access that log-on from your own Windows account.

There's one other possible security hole. Other user accounts on the system may have gotten access to your e-mail identity at some point and may still have access. If possible, log onto each of the other user accounts and remove your identity from the list of available identities. If it's the only identity present, use the same technique you did for the "guest" log-on.—*Neil J. Rubenking*

Ampersands in Excel Headers

I need to include an ampersand (as in "P S & G") in the header of an Excel sheet. But no matter what I do, the ampersand doesn't appear, just "P S G." Do you know how I can get it to show?

In Excel headers and footers, the ampersand is a control code. For example, &A inserts the name of the current worksheet tab. To insert a literal ampersand you must use two of them, as in "P S && G." Excel's own help system doesn't offer an easy way to learn the ampersand codes. To get a list, choose *Visual Basic Editor* from the *Macro* menu, click on *Help* within the VBA Editor's menu, and search on "formatting header footer" (no quotes). This should result in a single topic entitled "Formatting Codes for Headers and Footers," which lists all available ampersand codes.—*NJR*

Small Pictures Become Huge Documents in Word

A number of readers have written to us mystified by a file-size anomaly in Microsoft Word. They'll take a relatively small document, embed a relatively small picture, and wind up with a file that's absolutely immense, 20 or more times as large as the combined size of the document and picture. Yet a different document and picture won't experience this uncontrolled growth.

This problem specifically affects Microsoft Word 2000, 2002, and 2003. It surfaces when a document containing an image in JPEG, GIF, PNG, or EMF format is saved in Rich Text Format or in Word 6.0/95 format. If the document is saved in Word's current format, the problem doesn't arise.


FIGURE 2: In Excel, the ampersand is a control code used in formatting headers and footers.

According to Microsoft, this is actually a feature. When the document is exported to one of those two specific formats, two copies of the image are included. One is the original image; the other is the same image converted to Windows Metafile (WMF) format. The WMF format is designed to describe resizable vector-type drawings line drawings—and it's very efficient for those. But it's hideously inefficient at storing photographic images pixel by pixel.

Fortunately, a simple Registry tweak can turn off this "feature." Close all open instances of Word and launch REGEDIT from the *Start* menu's *Run* dialog. For Word 2003, navigate to the key *HKEY_CURRENT_ USER\Software\Microsoft\Office\11.0\Word\ Options.* Word 2002 users should change 11.0 to 10.0; Word 2000 users should change it to 9.0. Look in the right-hand pane for a value named *ExportPictureWithMetafile;* you probably won't find it. If the value is not present, right-click in the right-hand pane

To put any existing bloated files on a diet, first save them in the current Microsoft Word

format and then, if necessary, resave in the other format.—*NJR*

Printing in Black, Revisited

In the item "Printing in Black" (*http://go* .*pcmag.com/black*), we mentioned that most ink jets can't use their black ink on glossy paper. One reader insisted that no printer he has seen has to mix colors to print black, except for three-color printers that don't have black ink. We thought it would be useful to look at this issue in just a little more depth.

First, note that we referred to *most* ink jets. If you think your printer actually prints with black ink on glossy paper, you may have one of the exceptions. More likely, however, you haven't compared the output with a truly neutral version of the same image, and you haven't looked at the output with a high enough magnification to see the individual dots. Take a look at the screenshot that shows a section of a gray-scale image printed with an Epson Stylus C66, both life size and at 60X magnification (inset). The unmagnified version looks like a suitably neutral gray and black. But the magnified version clearly shows different color dots.

We don't have room here to discuss all the issues involved in creating neutral grays and blacks, but it's worth mentioning that even printers with black ink that work with glossy paper don't necessarily use only black ink for blacks and grays. The black ink by itself may have a slight tinge, in which case the printer may add other color inks to create a neutral look. For example, John Lamb, senior marketing manager at Canon U.S.A.'s Printer Group, says, "All of our printers use more than one color of ink to create gray-scale photos on glossy paper. Even the i9900, which has a dye-based black ink so it can use primarily black on glossy paper, adds yellow and magenta to yield a more neutral tone for gray-scale colors." The bottom line is that most ink jet printers don't use black ink on glossy paper, and you'll generally get better-looking monochrome photos from those few that do.-M. David Stone

A Desktop Shortcut to Hibernation

I want to program a shortcut key that puts the computer into hibernation mode. The problem is, I can't seem to find a command that will make the computer go into hibernation. Shutdown.exe doesn't seem to have that option. Will Rundll32.exe do this? Is there another solution? I look forward to your advice, which I appreciate very much. JOSEPH VOS

The shutdown.exe command can shut down or restart the computer, optionally forcing it to shut down even if some programs attempt to prevent it. See the article "Windows XP Shutdown Shortcut" (*http://go .pcmag.com/shutdown*) for more. But, as noted, it doesn't include an option to hibernate. The correct command is *rundll32.exe PowrProf.dll, SetSuspendState.* You can




FIGURE 5: Use the Command Prompt to create a file containing a list of filenames.

create a shortcut key combination to this command or assign it to a key on a programmable keyboard. Be sure to enter *SetSuspendState* exactly as shown, including the uppercase letters.

Of course, you must configure your system to allow hibernation. If you're not sure that your system has hibernation enabled, launch *Power Options* from the Control Panel, click on the *Hibernate* tab, and make sure that *Enable hibernation* is checked.—*NJR*

Putting the List of a Folder's Contents into Word

Is there a way to copy a list of filenames in a folder, as viewed in Windows Explorer, into a Word document without having to copy and paste each filename individually? If you open a folder and then highlight and copy a list of pictures, for example, and then paste into Word, all of the pictures are actually inserted. I want to copy just a list of the filenames of the pictures instead.

Yes, you can do it with a little help from the Command Prompt. First open the folder in Windows Explorer. Highlight its name in the Address bar and copy it to the clipboard. Now launch Command Prompt from the *Start* menu. Type *CD* " (that's *C*, *D*, *space*, *double quote*), then right-click, choose Paste, and press Enter. If the folder of pictures is on a different drive from the Windows drive, type the drive letter and a colon and press Enter. The prompt string in the Command Prompt window should be displaying the name of your folder; for example, "G:\Photos\Concert>". Now enter the command below exactly as shown:


DIR /ON /B *.* > C:\folderlist.txt

The /ON switch means *Order by Name;* in other words, sort the listing. The /B switch yields a "Bare" listing of just the filenames without the size and date/time stamp. And the "greater than" sign redirects the output of this command into the file C:\folderlist.txt. Open the folderlist.txt file in Word and you've got just what you were looking for.

If you don't mind spending a few bucks, TechSmith's Snaglt (\$39.95; *www .snagit.com*), our favorite screen capture tool, does this also—and a lot more. See our review of Snaglt at http://go.pcmag .com/snagit.

You may also want to test-drive Kleptomania 2.5 (*www.structurise.com*). Kleptomania is designed for exactly this application. It takes screenshots and converts any text in the graphic to usable text. There's a 21-day trial version, then it's \$29.95 for the Private version, \$49.95 for the Commercial version.—*NJR*

new components available. Dual-layer (DL) describes two-layer DVD media-not to be confused with dual-format, which refers to a DVD± RW drive. The dual-layer format increases the disc's capacity from 4.37GB to 8.5GB while remaining compatible with existing DVD players and DVD drives. Dual-layer applies only to DVD+R drives and media, but expect twolayer media for DVD-R drives in the future. (See our September 7 issue for a roundup of dual-layer DVD drives.)

Dual-layer DVD burners have made a splash in many high-end PCs and even in a few recent midrange desktops. But dual-layer DVD+R discs are still hard to find and cost about \$10. We expect pricing and availability to improve. Here's a look at other features and components you can find in this year's high-end, midrange, and all-in-one desktops.

his year's systems have kept PC evolution in full forward motion by kicking up performance, refining design, and adding slick new components. Last year's bleeding-edge multimedia features are now standard fixtures on midrange desktops. And new technologies have added another dimension to the consumer PC experience.

One of the most promising new additions to PC technology is **PCI Express** (PCIe). Approved as a standard in April, PCIe is a two-way serial interface that is designed to replace the original PCI and AGP and has double the transfer rate of AGP 8X (upstream and downstream). PCIe has the bandwidth for today's latest and tomorrow's graphics cards, as well as data throughput-intensive apps like Gigabit and faster—Ethernet, video I/O, and more. Cards for these apps have yet to be developed; for now, PCIe is all about improving 3D graphics performance.

For gamers, nVidia recently came out with **Scalable Link Interface (SLI)** technology. Two nVidia-based, SLI-ready graphics cards (like the 256MB nVidia GeForce 6800 Ultra) are linked to a pair of x16 slots on a PCIe motherboard (although one slot runs at x8 speed), allowing the two cards to split the workload and power up to four monitors. The result is incredibly fast performance on a multi-GPU desktop.

THE SKY'S THE LIMIT

When money is no object, we expect to see the latest technology and fastest components out there, not to mention sleek, innovative design. And this year's highend desktops didn't disappoint. Some feature the first 64-bit processors available for consumer desktops, including the AMD Athlon 64 FX-55, the Apple PowerPC G5, and even Intel Xeon processors.

Some high-end PCs also feature Serial ATA (SATA) hard drives in a RAID 0 configuration (a must for multitrack audio recording, among other things), scads of storage space (a terabyte in the MPC Millennia 940i Dream Machine), and highresolution displays—some widescreen, and some as large as 30 inches. A select group of LCDs offers 16-millisecond pixel response rates, good enough for playing this year's hottest games and taking on fast-motion multimedia loads.

The new SLI and PCIe technologies have brought screaming-fast graphics to the high-end market, and dual-layer DVD burners take data recording several steps

forward. Even single-layer DVD burners, mainstays in high-end systems for the past couple of years, are now surpassing 12X speed.

MORE FOR YOUR MONEY

For midrange desktops, \$1,000 goes farther than ever. That amount buys you a system with a 3.2-GHz Intel Pentium 4, 1.25-GHz PowerPC G4, or Athlon 64 3200+ processor, and a 17-inch CRT (1,280-by-1,024 screen resolution) or 15-inch LCD (1,024-by-768 native resolution). We even saw midrange systems with a 160GB SATA hard drive, and in the case of the Velocity Micro Vector SV-X, an eVGA GeForce 6600 graphics card (with PCIe capabilities).

The 3.2-GHz P4 processor featured in the Vector SV-X and Dell Dimension 4700 helped both systems garner SYSmark scores that came close to those of some of the high-end desktops we tested.

DESIGN INNOVATION: ALL-IN-ONES

Design is paramount in all-in-one desktops, in which the CPU is housed either behind the monitor or in its base. Squeezing useful features into a sleek, compact package is the hallmark of a good all-in-one desktop. Where those features are placed is equally important; USB ports tucked under an LCD bezel aren't exactly user-friendly.

This year, we saw systems with screens that could swivel both horizontally and

vertically. We were delighted with the addition of media card readers and with the way some of the all-in-ones can be mounted on a wall or on an optional swing-arm mount. Apple once again proved its prowess in this category with the iMac G5's innovative design.

In every desktop PC category, this year's technology and design innovations are sure to excite even the most jaded PC consumer. *—LAR*

Is a Media Center PC Right for You?

ne day, all of our multimedia content—photos, music, movies, even television shows—will flow through our PCs. And that day may be closer than we think. In fact, according to New York-based research firm NOP World, 4 percent of the 120 million households in the U.S. already use their PCs to watch TV, 24 percent to play music, and 22 percent to view photos or videos.

Naturally, many of the multimedia PCs we review in this story are specifically designed for such tasks. The Dell Dimension 8400, for example, with its six Klipsch speakers and Media Experience software, makes a great stereo. And unlike stereos of the past, it can download songs straight from the 16.) MCE 2005 boasts a few significant improvements, notably the inclusion of multiple TV tuners so you can watch one show and record another at the same time.

The OS also offers built-in CD- and DVD-authoring software to burn music, photos, and video from the same interface you use to play such media. There's even a built-in chat client. As you're flipping through a friend's digital photos, for example, the two of you can trade instant messages.

But if you want your PC to do *everything*, you should consider a Media Center PC. The latest Apple Power Mac G5 has a few new tricks: dual 2.5-GHz G5

processors and Apple's brilliant new Cinema HD Display, which knocked our socks off.

The processors—a noticeable step up from the 2.0-GHz processors of the previous top-end Macs—have a new heat-pipe system that uses thermally conductive liquid to carry heat from the processor surface to heat-dissipating fins. And there are separate air channels for the CPUs, memory and cards, and hard drives.

The Power Mac also has room for expansion. You can upgrade from the 160GB SATA to a 250GB drive (\$100), or even the dual 250GB SATA drive (\$425). The 23-inch display is bright and sharp and offers extremely high resolution. Its 16-millisecond pixel response rate is ideal for video content and even playing 3D games.

Users who need the fastest available speed will want to move to the new configuration. But those with recent-vintage G5 machines (especially dual 2.0-GHz models) won't need to jump on this upgrade.—Joel Santo Domingo

The widescreen LCD is the first thing you notice about the Compaq X GX5000Z. The 23-inch beauty leads you to believe there's a multimedia machine attached. Instead, you get a gaming machine that's mediocre when compared with similarly priced systems from boutique vendors.

Even with the latest graphics card, the GX5000Z finished at the bottom of the high-end PC pack on 3DMark03. It did a little better on the Doom 3 gaming test, however, getting closer to or beating some cheaper systems. Perhaps having the latest Athlon 64 FX-55 processor like our top scorers would have helped its performance.

Its multimedia capabilities largely miss the mark. The 148GB of storage just don't stack up to the hard drive space of the other gaming machines reviewed here. The Klipsch ProMedia Ultra 5.1 speakers and 16X dual-layer DVD burner were a nice touch.

The gorgeous display would have made the GX5000Z a hit as a gaming box or even a video-editing machine. Unfortunately, with its lack of storage and high price, you're better off looking at similarly priced gaming systems with more oomph.—KK

Among **gaming** systems, the **Falcon Northwest Mach V** amply displayed the gaming capabilities of a Xeon processor– and SLIequipped, multiple-GPU system. And with dual 300GB SATA hard drives, a 20-inch LCD, Klipsch ProMedia Ultra 5.1 speakers, and duallayer DVD±RW, its multimedia capabilities are unquestionable. The **Polywell Poly 939N-FX55** also earns our Editors' Choice in gaming. This Athlon 64 FX-55 system may lack the sexiest monitor and the fastest 3D test scores, but it performed surprisingly well, given its low price.

As a **multimedia** system, the **Dell Dimension 8400** has first-rate hardware, forward-thinking technologies, such as DDR2 and PCI Express, and a stellar software bundle—at a great price. The Velocity Micro Vision 64LX earns an honorable mention for impressive components, including 10,000-rpm drives and an AMD Athlon 64 3800+ processor. The Velocity Micro Vector SX-V, our pick among midrange systems, has the power to be your multimedia workhorse: It rated highly on music and video tests and was the top scorer among midrange desktops on the SYSmark tests. Our honorable mention, the Dell Dimension 4700, features dual-layer DVD burning and DDR2 memory, and scored admirably on the SYSmark and 3D benchmark tests.

For **all-in-one** desktops, the **Apple iMac G5** is all about design innovation, from its sleek white Lucite exterior to its almost wireless design. It can even handle fairly strenuous 3D games, with its nVidia GeForce FX 5200 Ultra graphics card. Honorable mention goes to the MPC ClientPro 414, for its dual optical drives—rare in this category—and DVR software.

Though pricey, the Falcon Northwest Mach V blew us away as a gaming machine. It's based on a 64-bit–capable, 3.6-GHz Xeon processor, so that the matching Intel E7525 chipset can support SLI. This Editors' Choice more than lives up to its promise.



Connected to a pair of PCIe x16 slots (although one runs at x8 speed), the nVidia GeForce FX 6800 Ultra graphics cards use up the entire PCIe x24 bandwidth of the E7525. SLI technology uses two identical graphics cards to share the load during 3D graphics processing, which helps render intense graphics at previously unattainable frame rates. This made for some impressive 3DMark03 numbers for the Mach V.

The only other SLI system in this roundup is the VoodooPC Rage F:5 SLI, which costs \$450 more and comes with far less storage. If money is no object, you won't be able to resist this state-of-the-art gaming box.—KK

multimedia hardware at a very low price. And although it doesn't quite stack up against much more expensive systems here, it's a good choice if you're pinching pennies.

The 7200XL includes a dual-layer multiformat DVD burner. For moving photos and video from your digital camera or camcorder, its front bezel offers USB and FireWire ports, as well as a 5-in-1 memory card reader.

The system's monitor and speaker set are adequate. And benchmark performance was respectably average. Our only major complaints are the old-school roller-ball mouse and the software bundle. Although the 7200XL is otherwise well equipped for audio, video, and photo tasks, it doesn't include any high-end multimedia packages.

If you can't spend more than \$3,000, the Gateway will suit you just fine. If you have a little more cash, consider the Dell or Velocity Micro high-end systems, which offer better performance, more hard drive space, and larger monitors.—*CM*

Its software bundle includes a number of video and photo tools from Ulead.

All you multimedia enthusiasts will love the many ways you can feed it movies, photos, and video. Its front bezel has FireWire and USB ports, as well as a 6-in-1 memory card reader.

Multimedia newbies should probably opt for Dell or Apple systems, but hardcore computer geeks will love the Vision 64LX.—CM

Although the F:5 comes with basic video-editing apps, the single-layer DVD±RW and 72GB hard drive dampen the F:5's abilities. Considering its mammoth price, we can't explain the lack of a deep storage drive and an extra duallayer burner, especially since 7.1 speakers are included.

The VoodooPC Rage F:5 SLI's beauty could boost egos and slaughter most competition—with our recommended upgrades, that is. Just be ready to pay the hefty price.—*KK*

How We Tested

ith this feature story, we're debuting a new series of benchmark tests created by the Business Applications Performance Corporation (BAPCo): SYSmark 2004. The SYSmark tests replace the Business Winstone and Content Creation Winstone tests we have used in the past.

Like Winstone, SYSmark includes office productivity and Internet content creation benchmark tests. The two scores are combined and given a weighted average to produce an overall performance rating. Both SYSmark tests derive scores by using real-world applications to run a preset script of user-driven workloads and usage models developed by application experts.

The **SYSmark 2004 Internet Content Creation** (ICC) test is organized as scenarios that are designed to simulate an Internet content creator's day. ICC incorporates such applications as Adobe Photoshop 7.01, Discreet's 3ds max 5.0, and Macromedia's Dreamweaver MX. (For a full list of the apps used in ICC, visit *www.bapco.com.*)

The SYSmark 2004 Office Productivity (OP) test BRA follows ICC's blueprint by mimicking the usage patterns of today's desktop and mobile business users, including <u>the concurrent execution of multiple programs</u>. Applications such

as Adobe Acrobat 5.0.5, McAfee VirusScan 7.0, and the Microsoft Office suite are used. Each SYSmark test measures the response time of the app to user input. Both scores are combined using a geometric mean to get an overall score. (Visit *www.pcmag.com* for more information on the SYSmark tests and the retiring of our Winstone tests.)

BAPCo also makes MobileMark, a notebook benchmark test for measuring battery life. We have decided to move to MobileMark when the next version is released later this year. Until then, we will continue using **Business Winstone 2004 BatteryMark.**

For the desktop systems, we ran the SYSmark tests at 1,024-by-768 resolution and 32-bit color. This matches the native resolution of many 15-inch LCD monitors and is one of the standard resolutions for which Web designers format sites.

For notebook systems, we ran BAPCo's SYSmark and our BatteryMark tests at native resolution, since notebook users are likely to use their systems this way.

Futuremark's 3DMark03 is a set of tests we use to evaluate a system's gaming performance. (Futuremark did not release 3DMark05 in time for our testing.) To ensure that all systems could complete 3DMark03 testing, we set anti-aliasing (AA) and anisotropic filtering (AF) at application preference and set the AA and AF settings in 3DMark03 to default. For our high-end desktop systems only, we ran a second test at 1,600-by-1,200 resolution, 4-sample anti-aliasing (4XAA), and 8-sample anisotropic filtering (8XAF). For high-end notebooks, we tested with native resolution and 4XAA and 8XAF.

Doom 3 has a self-contained benchmark test that uses OpenGL for all rendering. We tested the game on all high-end systems at two quality levels: first at 1,024-by-768 using the Medium quality setting, with anti-aliasing set to Off. This simulates a user trying to get good resolution but forgoing higher-quality textures in exchange for assured faster frame rates.



BRAVE NEW WORLD The Labs staff run SYSmark 2004 and gaming tests on desktops and notebooks.

We also tested Doom 3 at 1,600-by-1,200 (desktops) or native resolution (notebooks) at the High quality setting, with anti-aliasing set to 4X. The High quality setting automatically sets anisotropic filtering to 8X and uses more of the bells and whistles in the game engine, including uncompressed textures. We used this setting to simulate players who want a very detailed playing experience. There is an Ultra quality setting, but none of the current graphics cards can use this setting effectively.

We used the built-in **Halo: Combat Evolved** timedemo test with Pixel Shaders 2.0 (DX9) enabled. Since Halo's game engine doesn't use anisotropic filtering or anti-aliasing, they were turned off. We used Halo as a cross-platform test, because it has a Mac OS X-compatible version from MacSoft.

We ran **wireless tests** using a Linksys 802.11g access point to measure the throughput of each notebook's built-in wireless card and how far it can keep a stable connection. We ran our throughput tests with NetlQ's Chariot and a turntable provided by Intersil. The turntable is moved through four markers, at distances of 1 foot, 60, 120, and 160 feet.

We ran a series of **multimedia scripts** to determine how well equipped each system is for multimedia tasks. For music, we looked at speakers, sound cards, USB 2.0 ports, memory card slots, multimedia controls, as well as bundled software that allows the system to rip, burn, copy, and play audio files. For photos, we focused on USB 2.0 ports and memory card slots, along with software for cropping, eliminating red-eye, creating slide shows, and manipulating color and brightness. In rating video, we took into account FireWire ports, hard drive size, RAM, DVD burners, processors, video and TV inputs and outputs, monitor size, and speakers. We also looked at DVD playback and authoring, PVR software, and video-editing packages. For gaming, we looked at USB 2.0 ports, hard drives, graphics cards, processors, and speakers, and cool cosmetics like windowed cases and internal lighting.—*Cisco Cheng, Richard Fisco, and Joel Santo Domingo*

PERFORMANCE TESTS

How They Scored



Each of the SYSmark 2004 benchmark tests is calibrated to 100 points. The reference point is a 2.0-GHz Pentium 4 system with an 845G chipset, 512MB of memory, an ATI Radeon 9700 Pro graphics card, and an 80GB 7,200-rpm hard drive with 2MB cache, which would get a 100-point score on the test.

The high-end systems in this roundup (most of which have Microsoft Windows XP SP2 installed) all approached or surpassed the 200-point mark on SYSmark; the exceptions were the Power Mac, which cannot run Windows-based tests, and the ABS Ultimate M6, which couldn't complete the tests owing to glitches between the SYSmark OP test and Windows Service Pack 2. (We ran the SYSmark tests on the Gateway 7200XL and the midrange HP Pavilion a750y using SP1.) By scoring 200 points or more, these systems proved that they can perform office productivity and content creation tasks with aplomb.

A BETTER VALUE

Among the midrange systems, the Velocity Micro Vector SX-V and Dell Dimension 4700, each with a 3.2-GHz Pentium 4, produced SYSmark scores nearing those of the high-end systems.

The Compaq Presario SRI010Z, with the AMD Athlon 64 3200+

processor, outperformed the eMachines T3256, with the AMD Athlon XP 3200+, by about 22 percent on the SYSmark overall score. Though the Athlon 64 3200+ has a slower clock speed (2.0 GHz) than the Athlon XP 3200+ (2.2 GHz), the Athlon 64's integrated DDR memory controller and SSE2 optimizations helped it outperform the Athlon XP.

ALL-IN-ONES

The Gateway Profile 5.5 and MPC ClientPro 414, both equipped with 3.2-GHz P4s, led the pack among the all-in-one desktops. The ClientPro had a slight edge on the Profile because of its memory advantage (1GB versus 512MB) and more advanced graphics chipset. That said, the 6 percent difference between the two machines should be negligible in daily operations. As in the midrange space, the all-in-one leaders' SYSmark performance approached that of the high-end units. The Pelham Sloane PSI500 brought up the rear, suffering from smaller memory (256MB, which can be upgraded) and a slower 2.4-GHz P4 (which can't).

APPLE IS ON A PAR

As a Photoshop/digital creation workstation, the Apple Power Mac G5 earns its stripes, matching, and in some cases beating, the MPC all-in-one we tested for comparison. On our cross-platform tests with our usual 58MB file, the two desktops ran virtually neck and neck, proving that the Power Mac G5 is equal in performance

In the midrange space, the casual user is unlikely to notice the 2 to 5 seconds that separated the Apple eMac from the Velocity Micro Vector SX-V on our Unsharp Mask test. There is a similar performance gap in the all-in-one category between the Apple iMac G5 and Gateway Profile 5.5.

graphics cards with Scalable Link Interface (SLI) technology the Falcon Northwest Mach V and Voodoo PC Rage F:5 SLI—earned the top 3DMark03 scores, with previously unseen 20,000+ marks at 1,024-by-768 resolution. When we pushed the limits at 1,600-by-1,200 and 4XAA and 8XAF, the Mach V approached the 7,000 mark and the F:5 (barely) broke it. Both use a pair of GeForce 6800 Ultra cards, linked by an SLI connector. The connector doesn't pass graphics data, just timing and traffic control information.

> The heavy lifting is done by the PCIe interface connecting the graphics cards to the motherboard. With two GPUs crunching the graphics data, these two systems win hands down: They have about a 41 percent advantage (at 1,600by-1,200) over the fastest single-card solution, the Overdrive PC Torque.FX, which uses an overclocked ATI Radeon X800 XT AGP card.

perfectly capable gaming box. At the less stressful 1,024-by-768 resolution, all of our high-end PCs can play. But if you want to turn on all the bells and whistles, like anti-aliasing and anisotropic filtering, at high quality, there are currently only two choices: the VoodooPC Rage F:5 and the Falcon Northwest Mach V. Each of these SLI-powered systems can manage 60 fps or more at our most challenging setting.

The other high-end systems' 32- to 42-fps scores mean the game will still be somewhat playable at this resolution, but you'll probably want to switch to a lower quality setting or resolution. We did not use the Ultra setting during testing, because we found that you really need a single 512MB graphics card to handle it.

Halo: Combat Evolved was designed to play best at 30 fps. In our 3D testing, all high-end Windows PCs easily passed the Halo test, running much faster than 30 fps. The Power Mac G5 was able to muster a 35-fps score at the lower 1,024-by-768 resolution. At 1,600-by-1,200 resolution, the Power Mac's older ATI Radeon 9800XT card kept it from gaining a smooth frame rate of more than 30 fps. While still a powerful card, the Radeon 9800 XT is outclassed by the Radeon X800 XT and GeForce 6800 Ultra in the Windows PCs. There is a GeForce 6800 Ultra DDL build-to-order option for the Power Mac G5, but it wasn't available during our testing.

We attempted to run the two 3D game tests on the midrange and all-in-one systems, but only one could play these games at decent frame rates with our settings: the Velocity Micro Vector SX-V, with an eVGA GeForce 6600 card. The games are still playable on the other systems, including Halo on the Macs, but you'll have to turn the resolution down, or turn off some of the cool lighting, particle, and texturing effects in the games. — Analysis written by Joel Santo Domingo

Adobe Photoshop performance on the eMac was helped by the 512MB of RAM loaded on our system (256MB is standard), but 3D performance was still lacking: The eMac's 32MB ATI Radeon 9200 graphics card couldn't run the Halo gaming test with pixel shaders enabled, so we weren't able to record an official score.

If your household or school is Mac-centric, we suggest spending a few more bucks to get the high-end eMac or even splurging on the 17-inch iMac (\$1,374 with 512MB of memory). For everyone else, there are simply better \$999 systems out there, such as those from Dell and Velocity Micro.—JSD

This is a puzzling omission, considering the reasonable prices of such drives.



The Apple iMac G5 is no less sublime than its predecessors, but it's a lot more subtle. The system's CPU, motherboard, and drives are mounted in the same 2-inch thick monitor chassis. With optional Bluetooth and AirPort Extreme, this system comes close to a desktop replacement notebook without the battery.

The iMac G5's fans pull air in from the

bottom and let the warm air rise and exhaust through the top. The front panel is devoid of speakers, control buttons, and ports. The I/O ports are lined up vertically

Unlike other all-in-one systems we've seen, the Gateway Profile 5.5 uses the monitor base to house components that are usually mounted on the side of the screen, making access to them easier.

The Profile includes a wireless

keyboard and mouse and 802.11g connectivity. Its 17-inch display looks great from all angles, but unlike the Pelham Sloane display, it has limited height adjustment (3 inches) and can't swivel from side to side.

The integrated speakers aren't much better than your basic two-piece desktop set, so you may want to purchase a 2.1 speaker system for better listening; this system doesn't support 5.1 sound capabilities. And while the Profile won't satisfy hard-core gamers, its storage capacity and memory card reader will appeal to photo-imaging fans.

The Profile turned in respectable scores on the SYSmark OP and ICC benchmark tests, blowing past the Pelham Sloane system but slightly trailing the MPC all-in-one.

With its wireless features, small footprint, and three-year warranty, the Profile is a safe bet for home or office users, particularly when desk space is at a premium.-JD



When compared with the other all-in-ones here, the Pelham Sloane PS1500 stands out for all the wrong reasons. It has a small screen, too many wires, and dismal performance on our benchmark tests.

The PS1500's 15-inch screen is its best feature; though its maximum resolution is only 1.024-by-768. ► MULTIMEDIA: Music: 63 Photos: 45 Video: 29 Gaming: 25 it is bright and clear. We also like that the screen can swivel horizontally and vertical-

The iMac G5's faster processor delivered a speed boost over the iMac G4, completing three of four Photoshop tests more quickly. And with the nVidia GeForce FX 5200 Ultra graph-

ics, the system can play fairly strenuous 3D games.

The MPC ClientPro 414 is a powerful business desktop, but with its TV tuner, DVR software, and dual optical drives, it's also ready to entertain.

The 414 has dual optical drivesrare for an all-in-one system. AV connections include optical audio, S-Video ports, a TV tuner with dual video-in jacks, and an antenna jack. MPC bundles InterVideo's WinDVR software for recording and storing TV

shows. There's also a wireless remote, keyboard, and mouse, as well as an integrated 802.11g adapter. You can change TV channels with buttons on the monitor bezel.

The 17-inch LCD is bright, but you can't adjust the height or horizontal viewing angle without moving the entire system. MPC compensates for the mediocre built-in speakers by including the Creative I-Trigue 2.1 speaker system.

The 414 outperformed the others here on both SYSmark tests, and its 3D scores were above average. Although the most expensive all-in-one system here, its performance and features are first-rate.—JD



Considering the system's steep price, we are surprised by the lack of bundled software. We also think a wireless keyboard and mouse should be included.



Notebooks



he big news for notebooks this year is that thanks to a growing focus on multimedia, people can enjoy their music, movies, games, and photos in newer, better ways. Here's a look at what features you can expect to find in each category of notebook: high-end, mainstream, value, and ultraportable.

HIGH-END

At 7 to 10 pounds, these desktop replacements have 15.1- to 17-inch LCDs, many with wide screens and high-gloss treatments that deliver crisp images and deep colors.

High-end graphics processors, such as the ATI Radeon Mobility 9700, have up to 256MB of memory—ideal for passionate gamers. High-end video systems come with DVD±RW drives, TV tuners and remote controls for watching TV on your notebook. Good speakers round out the experience. Hard drives have stepped up to meet the demands of multimedia. Most hold about 80GB, with speeds ranging from 5,400 to 7,200 rpm.

As for processors, you'll find some of the fastest chips here, with speeds up to 3.4 GHz. Some systems include the Intel Pentium M chip. Designed specifically for notebooks, it has lower clock speeds (the highest is 2.1 GHz) but still offers high performance and extended battery life.

MAINSTREAM

Aimed at the person who values mobility and productivity equally, these 4- to 7pound notebooks are outfitted primarily with power-conserving processors like the Pentium M. Hard-drive sizes currently measure about 80GB, and graphics, usually from ATI or nVidia, are mainly midrange. That is fine for DVD watching and recording TV, which don't require heavy graphics.

Many mainstream notebooks now have wide screens, from 14.1 to 15.4 inches. Opti-

cal drives are more of a mixed bag, from DVD/CD-RW combo drives to more impressive DVD±RW drives.

VALUE

These notebooks cost under \$1,000, and their weight ranges from 5.4 to 7.5 pounds. For processing power, Celeron chips generally dominate this group, but you can find other chips, such as the new AMD Sempron.

Other goodies include widescreen displays, DVD/ CD-RW combo drives, and 802.11g.

ULTRAPORTABLE

In systems weighing less than 4 pounds, it's amazing what manufacturers manage to squeeze in year after year.

Processors range from a sluggish Pentium 1.0 GHz to a fast 1.8-GHz Pentium M, and hard drives have ballooned to 60GB. Graphics are almost always embedded, which is more than ad-

equate for the tasks these systems are asked to perform: e-mail, Internet browsing, and DVD watching.

Screen sizes range from 8.9 inches to 12.1 inches, and some are widescreens. Keyboard sizes range from a 16-mm pitch to a full-size 19 mm. Battery life also varies widely, from 2 to 6 hours.

Following are 24 of the hottest new notebooks. Whether weight, power, price, or multimedia features are your top priority, we have the right system for you.


The Inspiron 9200 boasts a bright 17-inch display, the fastest Pentium M 765 (2.1 GHz) currently available, and the longest battery life we've seen in a desktop replacement—all for a very good price. On top of that, customers will be thrilled to know that Dell has included a multiformat DVD±RW drive, instead of one that can handle only DVD+RW discs.

We were very impressed with the image quality on the Dell UltraSharp screen when we played a DVD. We also like the convenient DVDplay and volume-control buttons and the Dell

was off the charts, at 4:59. The normal life for a desktop replacement is 2 to 3 hours.

If TV tuning is important to you, you may want to look at the Toshiba Qosmio or the HP Pavilion zd8000. If it's not, the Dell Inspiron 9200 is a great multimedia buy at a deal of a price.—Cisco Cheng

The Gateway M675XL is a respectable multimedia system with strong performance and impressive hardware, such as a 17-inch display and a 6-in-1 memory card reader. But for \$2,799, we expected a little more. The high-resolution 17-inch screen doesn't trump the Toshiba Qosmio's screen in brightness, but it's more than adequate for DVD watching. Multimedia lovers will appreci-

ate the DVD±RW drive, memory-card reader, audio-out port, and the CD/DVD hardware controls (play, stop, rewind, forward, volume up, and volume down). Unfortunately, the M675XL's speaker quality was weak; the HP zd8000 had the best sound in the group that we tested.

The M675XL held its own on performance tests, particularly on content creation and, surprisingly, gaming tasks. Overall, it's a decent system, with a good screen and a fine feature set. But for those more interested in photos, video, and music, the HP zd8000 and the Toshiba Qosmio might be the better bets.—*CC*

Despite a gorgeous screen, the Sony VAIO VGN-A190 needs a boost in hardware, and its proprietary multimedia software, GigaPocket, could use a rev. If you just have to have this system, buy it with Microsoft Windows Media Center Edition 2005 to make the most of it.

The XBrite 17-inch widescreen display is fantastic, with high resolution (1,920by-1,200). An ambient light sensor, Ergo-Bright, automatically adjusts the screen's brightness to accommodate

The HP Pavilion zd8000 is a terrific multimedia notebook that's packed with new technologies like Microsoft Windows XP Media Center 2005, PCI Express graphics, and an ExpressCard slot.

The zd8000 scored the highest multimedia ratings we've seen on any notebook. It also has a gorgeous BrightView 17inch widescreen display and an external HP USB Dual TV tuner, which lets you watch one show while recording another.

Its Harman Kardon speakers had impressive sound.

The zd8000 comes with the new ExpressCard/54 PC Card slot—which offers high-speed transfers of 250 Mbps each way—and PCI Express graphics from the 256MB ATI Mobility Radeon X600 card. But its gaming test scores were average, because of its basic X600 GPU.

HP should be applauded for including new technologies in the zd8000 and for producing a top-rated system that is sure to please many multimedia enthusiasts -CC

The notebook comes with a docking station, where the TV tuner resides, and a set of sleek, triangular external speakers. When we used GigaPocket, it was hard to manage and unresponsive at times. For example, when we played back recorded video, one of the recordings had audio but no video. When we toggled from the recorded material to live television, we sometimes lost the picture altogether.

With the least memory and slowest processor and hard drive in our high-end notebook roundup, the A190 was at the bottom of the heap

The Toshiba Qosmio E15 is a sleek portable with the most multimedia features of any system here. It's the only high-end system that gives you Instant-on—a feature that lets you watch DVDs and play music without booting up the system. Honorable mention in this category MAGAZINE goes to the HP Pavilion zd8000. Larger than the Qosmio, it has a CHOICE 17-inch widescreen display and an external TV tuner, and it yielded strong overall performance. It also debuts new technologies, like PCIe and the latest Windows XP Media Center 2005 Edition.

The **HP Pavilion dv1000** is a slick, lightweight multimedia gem, and is our choice in the mainstream category. Its 14.1-inch widescreen display is bright and clear. Instant-on and a 6-in-1 memory card reader make this a sure winner. The Compaq Presario R3000Z is a heavy system, at almost

nine pounds, but its power and connectivity options earn it an honorable mention.

The **eMachines M5405** is a jam-packed **value** system for \$999. It has a gorgeous 15.4-inch widescreen display and good multimedia features and yields top performance. Honorable mention goes to the **Compag Presario V2000**, a fantastic-looking, smaller system with a 14.1-inch screen and great performance. If portability is your primary concern, opt for the V2000.

Will anyone dethrone our reigning **ultraportable** champion, the **IBM** ThinkPad X40? It's compact, sturdy, and light, with a full-size keyboard, and its battery can last 6 hours. The **Dell Inspiron 700m** has incredible performance, but short battery life. Carry an extra on the road.

Toshiba Qosmio E15

The Toshiba Qosmio E15 is a true entertainment center, with its gorgeous 15.1-inch Tru-Brite screen, good speakers, and built-in TV tuner. The best part: You can enjoy videos, music, and photos without booting up your system—a feature unique in this roundup. The Qosmio retains the Editors' Choice in this category.

> At press time, the E15 was running Microsoft Windows Media Center 2002, but we suspect it will be running the 2005 updated version shortly. Toshiba has included several quick-play buttons to launch the TV tuner and DVD player.

A Composite-In button lets you switch quickly to your connected camcorder or Microsoft Xbox, while the TV-Out button routes images from the notebook to a monitor or TV. You can also use one of

several AV ports, like S-Video-out and Component-out, The E15's performance wasn't earth-shattering. This system isn't for 3D gamers, but it works fine for watching DVDs and recording video.

No multimedia portable can match the Qosmio, though the HP Pavilion zd8000 comes close. This is a true

portable entertainment center.—*CC*

With the VoodooPC Envy m:380, you don't get what you pay for. The system includes an Intel Pentium M 755 (2.0 GHz) processor and a very good graphics chipset, but the components and vividly colored finish can't justify the outrageous price tag of \$4.395.

Sleek and svelte, the m:380 is the lightest of the high-end systems we reviewed, with a 15.4-inch widescreen display and a system weight of just 7.3

If portable gaming tops your list, the sexy Velocity Micro NoteMagix S90 fills the bill, offering both great gaming and rich components, like the dual 60GB RAID 0 hard drives.

The S90 sports a splashy, eve-

catching red paint job. though you can forgo that and save \$300. Its 17-inch widescreen display is on a par with the Gateway M675XL's screen, though it feels flimsier.

The S90 includes a built-in TV tuner, for routing TV programming to your notebook, and S-Video-in to accommodate your camcorder. There's also a DVD±RW burner and a 6-in-1 card reader.

The S90's SYSmark 2004 scores overall were top in the group, partly because of its RAID O configuration. The 256MB ATI Mobility Radeon 9700 graphics helped it deliver a divine gaming experience.

The S90 is slick, expensive, and powerful-a combination that lures dedicated gamers. But if gaming is more your hobby than your passion, look to the Dell Inspiron 9200 as a less expensive option.—*CC*

pounds. It sports VoodooPC's signature tattoo insignia set against a scarlet finish.

The system comes with a fast 7,200-rpm, 60GB hard drive and a 128MB ATI Mobility Radeon 9700. The Velocity Micro NoteMagix S90 trumps this configuration, with dual RAID 0 hard drives and double the memory in the same graphics chip.

The m:380 ranked near the bottom of our roundup (along with the Sony VAIO A190) on our SYSmark tests, but it did well on our Doom 3 gaming and 3DMark03 tests.

> Although the m:380 has some decent components and a flashy design, we expect more for the money. If you want a top gaming machine, consider the Velocity Micro system instead.-CC

PERFORMANCE TESTS

Battery life goes longer, processors get stronger, and screens go wide.



Notebooks are all about mobility, and some of the best new technologies capitalize on this freedom. We saw longer battery lives this year, thanks mostly to the Pentium M; stronger mainstream performance from mobile processors like the Mobile AMD Athlon 64; and stronger high-end performance from the 3.4GHz P4.

On the high end, we saw more graphics memory and a RAID 0 hard drive configuration to enhance the gaming experience.

In the high-end category, the Dell Inspiron 9200 came with the latest Intel Pentium M 765 processor (2.1 GHz). Pentium M processors consume less power and possess advanced power-saving capabilities, as opposed to their desktop counterparts. Here, the Pentium 765 led to the best overall BatteryMark score (4:59). In addition, the 128MB ATI Mobility Radeon 9700 helped the 9200 achieve top scores on the 3DMark03 and Halo benchmark tests.

Perhaps the biggest new technology we saw in notebooks—PCI Express (PCIe)—debuted on the HP Pavilion zd8000. Borrowed from the desktop side, it is used with the Intel 915 desktop chipset. (This is not the much anticipated mobile chipset from Intel, codenamed Alviso, which is set to debut in the first quarter of 2005.)

PCIe opens the door for better and greater graphics data transfer by scaling bandwidth beyond 4GB per second bidirectionally.

HIGH-END, HIGH PERFORMANCE: HP AND VELOCITY MICRO

The zd8000 garnered first place on Internet Content Creation (ICC) at 208, and top scores on SYSmark Office Productivity (OP) at 144.

But despite its PCIe graphics, the zd8000 did not dominate in the gaming arena, because its 256MB ATI Mobility Radeon X600 is just not that powerful a graphics processor. (Think of it as being on a par with the ATI Mobility Radeon 9600.) And although the zd8000 has the Mobility Radeon X600, it lacks AXIOM, ATI's modular design for upgradability. AXIOM gives the user more flexibility to change and upgrade to future graphics lines.

The Velocity Micro NoteMagix S90 achieved the best SYSmark OP score (211). Credit goes mostly to the twin 60GB, 7,200-rpm hard drives, which are striped in a RAID 0 configuration, optimizing performance and storage capacity.

> Unfortunately, the Sony VAIO VGN-A190 came with only 512MB of system memory and 64MB of graphics memory, whereas most systems in the high-end category had at least 1GB and 128MB, respectively. The VGN-A190 could not generate Doom 3 scores on medium to high-quality settings and yielded the lowest scores, beating only the Toshiba Qosmio E15, on both 3DMark03 and Halo.

> Many of the systems in our high-end and mainstream categories could not complete the gaming benchmark tests at their native resolution because the games were unable to support various widescreen resolutions (16:10 and 16:9 aspect ratios). In the mainstream category, the graphics hardware and memory limitations account for the "N/A" results at 1,024-by-768 resolution. The systems failed to run 75 percent of the tests.

COMPAQ, DELL DOMINATE MAINSTREAMS

The Compaq Presario R3000Z is the only system in the mainstream category with the Mobile AMD Athlon 64 3400+ processor. With its 1MB of L2 cache, the R3000Z garnered very good SYSmark scores (119 on OP and 180 on ICC) and the secondbest BatteryMark score (3:49), thanks to its 98-Wh battery. That four of the seven units in the mainstream category came with an Intel Pentium M highlights the strong performance and success of this processor line. The Dell Inspiron 8600 and the WinBook W362 have the highest-clocked Pentium M processors (2.0 GHz), and the 8600 placed first on battery life (4:21). With 128MB of graphics memory—the largest amount in this category—the 8600 was able to run 3DMark03 in its native resolution. Certain tests in 3DMark03, especially in higher resolutions with filtering and anti-aliasing turned on, require at least 128MB to render scenes.

EMACHINES MAKES ITS MARK

In the value category, the eMachines M5405 had the first AMD Sempron processor we've seen. The Mobile AMD Sempron 2800+ has 256KB of L2 cache (half the amount of L2 cache found on Athlon XP chips) and has the same chip design as the Mobile AMD Athlon 64 (K8 core) counterparts, but without the 64-bit support. Rated at 1.6 GHz, the Sempron 2800+ helped push the M5405 to first place on SYSmark ICC (131) and second place (97) on SYSmark OP (just 2 percent shy of first place).

But the M5405 came up short on BatteryMark (2:38) compared with the Celeron M systems: the Compaq Presario V2000 (3:26) and the HP Pavilion ze4900 (3:13). Based on their BatteryMark scores, the units with Celeron M processors had slightly better thermal and power management capabilities. The eMachines system has the better battery (65 Wh versus 47.5 Wh and 49 Wh on the two Celeron M value systems), yet on battery life, it came up 44 minutes short of the Compag system.

DESKTOP VS. MOBILE CHIPS

The Gateway M520CS Plus was built with a 2.53-GHz Intel Celeron D 350, which is a desktop chip. In contrast, the Toshiba Satellite A65 is built with the 2.8-GHz Mobile Intel Celeron. The Gateway dominated the Toshiba on SYSmark tests, even though the Mobile Intel Celeron had the higher clock frequency. With its Celeron D, the Gateway outscored the Toshiba system by a large margin on both SYSmark OP (99 versus 53) and ICC (124 versus *continued on page 126*

73). It also placed second on SYSmark ICC against the eMachines system. The Celeron D is built around a 90-nm process (a different core from that of the Mobile Intel Celeron) and has a larger L2 cache (256MB versus 128MB).

DELL OUTPERFORMS IN ULTRAPORTABLES

In the ultraportable category, the Dell Inspiron 700m had the fastest processor (Pentium M 735, 1.8 GHz). It outperformed the competition on both SYSmark OP and ICC. But since the Dell system's 32-Wh battery is the smallest in the group, it scored poorly on BatteryMark (2:01) compared with the IBM ThinkPad X40, whose 62-Wh battery clocked nearly 6 hours.

The Fujitsu LifeBook P7010D was the only unit to have the Atheros 802.11a/g wireless module with the Super G enhanced "g" mode. When the notebook was paired with a D-Link 802.11a/g router with Super G mode, the system achieved a phenomenal throughput of 57.1 Mbps at 1 foot and 60 feet (not shown), but this rate can be achieved only if you have an access point enabled with a Super G mode. When we tested in standard 802.11g mode, the LifeBook's test scores were still tops: 25.3 Mbps at both 1 and 60 feet.

Apple designs very sexy machines, and the Apple PowerBook G4 is a fine example, though you'll spend a pretty penny for such design.

> Though crisp, the G4's 15.2-inch TFT widescreen display lacks the luster of some

comparable displays. As a self-proclaimed multimedia pioneer, Apple needs to think about

adding extra-bright screens into its lineup. The G4 is the only

system here to have both FireWire 400 and 800 ports. It also includes a DVD-R/CD-RW SuperDrive and an AirPort Extreme 802.11g.

The G4 scored the highest points in our mainstream category for video and gaming on our multimedia scripts. But the HP Pavilion dv1000 edged it out on our DVD rundown tests and on our Photoshop 7.0 Lighting Effects test, turning in a time of 12 seconds versus the G4's 14 seconds.

Apple fans will spend what it takes to get a PowerBook, but if you're deciding between a PC and a Mac and you're tight on cash, save 800 and go with the multimedia-centric HP dv1000.—*CC*

really is (8.7 pounds). The R3000Z comes with a DVD+RW drive instead of a dual-format DVD drive, though it does include a 6-in-1 card reader and three USB ports.

Its performance was also excellent, just a bit behind the top-performing Dell Inspiron 8600 on most of our tests. The R3000Z makes for a good gaming machine, as it got the top scores on our Doom 3 and Halo gaming tests. It was also at the top of the heap, alongside the HP dv1000, on our multimedia tests for music and photo.

The R3000Z packs a powerful punch and is the best mainstream gaming system here. There are better multimedia notebooks, but for gaming, the R3000Z is the one.—CC

The 8600 performed exceptionally well on our tests, turning in the best scores on SYSmark Office Productivity and BatteryMark. Thanks to the 128MB ATI Radeon 9600 graphics card, this system also

did well on 3DMark03. All in all, the Dell 8600 is a powerful system. But for greater gaming power and better connectivity, check out the Compaq Presario R3000Z.—*CC*

IBM is known for making reliable businessclass notebooks with outstanding construction and keyboards. (The company tends to shy away from multimedia features.) The R51 fits this description, though its lackluster performance and battery life will leave consumers wanting more.

The R51 is the only mainstream notebook here to have dual pointing devices; we have always been fans of IBM's patented TrackPoint and full-

size keyboard. Also unique in our roundup is the R51's inclusion of a dual 802.11a/g wireless solution, so you're covered in any wireless situation. Unfortunately, there are only two USB ports for connectivity, though there is a FireWire port.

On our SYSmark tests, IBM scored dead last among mainstream notebooks. Its battery life was equally unimpressive, clocking in at 2:56.

ThinkPad notebooks traditionally are top-rated machines with a proven record of reliability. But the R51 is subpar. For a better business system, opt for one of IBM's T series notebooks, and for better multimedia systems, go with the HP Pavilion dv1000.—*CC*

Lacking Sony's signature craftsmanship, the Sony VAIO PCG-K27 doesn't exactly turn heads. The bulky frame packs in a few good features, but its performance proved little match for its competition.

Our initial reaction upon seeing the PCG-K27 was that this couldn't be a Sony notebook. The 8.0-

pound system is neither sexy, slim, nor sleek. But it does have a bright 15.4-inch widescreen display with XBrite technology, as well as a DVD \pm RW drive and an 80GB hard drive.

Performance was not the PCG-K27's strong suit. Its SYSmark scores were far below those of the two performance leaders here, the HP Compaq Presario R3000Z and the Dell Inspiron 8600. The PCG-K27 did shine in wireless performance, however, leading all others in this group on 802.11g throughput.

Overall, the PCG-K27 is unimpressive. If you're looking for a portable multimedia notebook, you're better off with the HP Pavilion dv1000. If you're looking for a system that packs more of a wallop, the Compaq Presario R3000Z and Dell Inspiron 8600 are the stallions of the group.—CC

The ATI Radeon 9600 graphics chipset had a lot of trouble on our 3DMark03 and Doom 3 tests, being unable to complete either. And its 802.11g wireless scores were the poorest across the board. Battery life was fine, at 3:14.

Overall, the W362 has average features and average performance, and simply doesn't cut it among the competition. Look to other notebooks here to get more for your money.—*CC*

2800+ processor, which helped it earn top scores in performance. It's also the only value notebook here to offer a 15.4-inch widescreen display—and it's an impressive one. The 1,280-by-800 resolution screen has an excellent viewing angle and rich colors. The three USB ports are all on the rear; we wish at least one were on the side.

Though its SYSmark scores and wireless range were impressive, the M5405's battery life was average: 2:38. The Compag Presario V2000's battery lasted the longest at 3:26, though it does have a smaller screen.

Perhaps our only real complaint is that eMachines doesn't offer toll-free tech support, but the M5405 delivers. If you're looking for a high-performance widescreen beauty that doesn't cost a lot, don't hesitate to pick up this system.-JD

What Apple does give you, though, is iPhoto for digital pictures, iMovie for digital videos, and iTunes for digital music. The LCD delivers a

sharp image and resists glare well. The iBook unit lasted 3:04 on our DVD rundown test when using the built-in DVD playback power scheme. (The JVC ultraportable fared best at 3:10.) The built-in AirPort Extreme 802.11g wireless network adapter easily connects to Wi-Fi networks nearby.

Although its weight and small hard drive keep it from being an ideal ultraportable, the iBook G4 is a good choice for Apple users who care about style and affordability. With the strongest processor and fastest hard drive here, the 700m streaked past the others in performance. Its weak spot is its poor battery life (2:01) with the four-cell battery. For travel, opt for the eight-cell battery (\$110), which will double battery life.

Overall, the Dell Inspiron 700m offers a good combination of features in a small yet powerful package. And it's the least expensive Windows system in our ultraportables group.—*Joseph A. Guilbeau IV*

The X40's software bundle is aimed at corporate travelers. It includes IBM Access Connections, a proprietary tool that personalizes computer settings such as network connections, e-mail, and programs. The Access IBM button on the keyboard provides quick access to system recovery.

The ThinkPad X40 is a longtime favorite among traveling users. Portability, power, and smart features have kept it a true winner.—*OC*

Every other notebook outperformed the Mini Note PC on our SYSmark tests, perhaps because of its low memory. It's the only Windows ultraportable in this group with less than 512MB of RAM. Still, it can handle everyday computing and DVD playback adequately.

All things considered, the JVC MP-XV841 Mini Note is a fun little ultraportable. In the niche of entertainment-oriented ultraportables, where DVD watching is key, the Mini Note is the one to watch.—*Alphonse Ragusa* \equiv



The software and services you need to tune up and turbocharge your business

mall businesses have plenty of things to worry about besides their computer systems. In an environment where every dollar of expense and every minute of productivity counts—and where dedicated IT staff are an impossible dream—taking time out to manage technology is a serious challenge. Still, that doesn't mean that mom-and-pop shops have to forgo software that can help their businesses run more smoothly and cost effectively than old-fashioned, paper-based

systems. Small-business owners and employees can find a plethora of applications to help them interact with customers better, manage finances and employees, maintain a compelling Web presence, and keep their systems running smoothly—all things that can have a positive impact on the bottom line. For essential tasks from managing your money to maintaining your Web site, this overview identifies tools that will help you spend less time tinkering with technology so you can get back to business.

Most small-business software is designed to be installed on individual PCs, but Web-based products are fast becoming a realistic alternative for some applications. If you have a high-speed Internet connection in your office or retail location, products like Intuit's QuickBooks Online or Salesforce.com's offerings mean users can work from any machine with a Web browser. There's no need to install or update software on individual machines beyond, perhaps, a browser-based ActiveX plug-in. Web-based software that's billed in monthly installments can also reduce the up-front cost of purchase. But if you choose a Web-based solution, keep in mind that it may not be available when you're disconnected (though some have off-line clients), and make sure you have contingency plans for extracting your data should you later wish to change providers. In "Business IT: Rent or Buy?" (http://go.pcmag.com/businessit), we explore this topic in more depth.

In this story, we've examined both Webbased and traditional, packaged software, and organized them into a variety of key business functions that almost every small company needs to perform. Our sidebar, "More Small-Business Services," covers leading products in additional software categories that may be useful for some companies.

Of course, many businesses also have a variety of industry-specific applications to choose from. Whether you're an insurance agent or an optometrist, you'll find off-the-shelf vertical products that meet



many of your needs in a single package. We haven't tried to list those possibilities in this overview. Nor have we covered software that typically comes preinstalled on systems, like the operating system and office productivity applications (e-mail, word processing, and spreadsheet), or conversely, the kind of heavily customized and expensive software projects that companies have to order through specialized system integrators and consultants.

MANAGE YOUR MONEY & EMPLOYEES

ccounting may not be the most glamorous aspect of running a business, but it certainly is a necessity: Every company needs to track accounts payable and receivable and manage payroll for its employees. Payroll is often outsourced to third-party providers, though. Choosing the right accounting package can make a potentially tedious chore more tolerable—and give you a better picture of your business's condition, which enables you to exchange financial data with your accountant, tax preparer, and bank more effectively.



Our favorite family of accounting products for small businesses comes from Intuit. Our current Editors' Choice, **QuickBooks Premier 2004** (\$499.95 list), is an outstanding product with comprehensive features and impressive ease of use. QuickBooks excels not just at making accounting painless but also at helping educate business owners about how to manage their companies effectively. QuickBooks

also provides time-tracking capabilities, so you can bill customers and easily compute wages for hourly employees. Smaller businesses that don't need extensive customization may find that **QuickBooks Pro 2004** (\$299.95 list) or **QuickBooks Basic 2004** (\$199.95 list) has everything they need.

QuickBooks Online Edition (starting at \$19.95 a month for three users) is an additional option for companies that don't need to track inventory. Its Webbased interface is relatively rich



and responsive, though we miss some of the conveniences of traditional Quick-Books software, such as quick sorting and reformatting when viewing reports. (Intuit Inc., *www.intuit.com*. Premier 2004 •••••; Online Edition •••••

Beyond the QuickBooks accounting options, Intuit also sells a variety of complementary financial tools for small businesses, like its **QuickBooks Point of Sale** (starting at \$799.95).

Microsoft Money Small Business 2005 Edition (\$89.95 list) is best suited for singleowner businesses where the proprietor manages personal and business finances within a single package. personal-finance package. Nevertheless, although we found its business-accounting features easy to use, the product's focus on personal-finance management may be a negative if you want to maintain a strict separation between home and company accounts. (Microsoft Corp., *www.microsoft .com.*

An appealing payroll package for small businesses is **PayCycle** (starting at \$10 per month), which is an online-only service that lets you generate paychecks, pay federal and local taxes, and file the necessary forms—all with a friendly interface and free tech support. PayCycle integrates with QuickBooks and Money to simplify payroll tasks. (PayCycle Inc., www.paycycle.com.

Several other sophisticated accounting

packages are available. But their interfaces are aging, and they can't match the sleekness of QuickBooks and Money. Nevertheless, they may appeal to users with a double-entry accounting background. Best Software's Peachtree series, including the flagship **Peachtree Premium Accounting 2005** (multi-user version, \$999.99 direct; single-user version, \$499.99) offers excellent in-

ventory handling, time tracking, and superb reporting options thanks to the included Crystal Reports 9.0 engine. (Best Software SB Inc., www.peachtree.com. ••••••) Small businesses with less-

complex needs could also get by with **Peachtree Complete Accounting 2005** (\$299.99 direct) or **Peachtree Accounting 2005** (\$199.99 direct). **MYOB Plus** (\$249 direct) has multicurrency support. (MYOB Limited, *www.myob.com.* ••••••) ACCPAC's **Simply Accounting 2004 PRO** (\$99 direct) also supports multiple currencies. (ACCPAC International Inc., *www.simplyaccounting.com.* ••••••>

Although you'll probably track payroll data in your accounting software, managing additional information about employees and job applicants can be a nuisance too. For a more formal system, you might consider supplementing your accounting package with humanresources management products targeted at the needs of small businesses. Soft-Q Human Resource Suite (\$631.65 direct) is a simple database application that lets you track employee information, including salary history, vacation and absences, training, and benefits. (Teilhard Technologies, www.soft-q.com. ••••00) HR-Office 4.0 (starting at \$995) offers similar features and more, such as job applicant management capabilities and self-service administration options-all wrapped up in an appealing interface. erving return customers is almost always more profitable than acquiring new ones; so it pays to treat your clients well. Although the financial packages we mentioned often provide basic capabilities for tracking customer information, many companies can benefit from a more focused customer relationship management (CRM) product.

Microsoft Outlook provides basic contact management capabilities in its address book, and you can share a centralized contact list if you're running Microsoft Exchange server or its equivalent. But most businesses are likely to want something more sophisticated. One option

For those who want a more traditional way of building a site locally and then deploying it to the Web host of their choice, the software we recommend is Macromedia Contribute 3 (\$149 direct). Contribute 3 makes it easy to build a Web site with extensive predefined styles, gives you room to grow with its built-in Dreamweaver MX 2004 engine, and includes valuable vet simple workflow and collaborative features. If you're graphically savvy and looking to build a particularly rich site, Macromedia Dreamweaver MX 2004 (\$399 direct) remains the tool of choice. With its high-end design features and built-in support for creating sophisticated database-driven sites, your small business is unlikely to outgrow its capabilities. Microsoft FrontPage 2003 (\$199 list) can also do an excellent job building your site. SECURE YOUR DATA

e wish this category weren't necessary, but you need software and tools to ensure that your systems stay secure and your data stays safe. Unfortunately, the potential for both accidents (think hard-drive failures) and malicious attacks (worms, spyware, hackers, and more) is great, and you must be proactive.

Your business should have a multipronged data-protection strategy that includes defense—firewall, antivirus, and antispyware—plus reliable backups to guard against the possibility of disaster. Just as important as having the strategy is sticking to it. Make sure that backups are performed religiously and that software patches are applied regularly.

There are a variety of places where

you can put software to work defending your infrastructure. First, and most obvious, is on individual client machines. But installing and maintaining software on

multiple machines can become tedious quickly, and users may not manage their desktops correctly despite all the software you load on them. All but the smallest businesses will benefit from perimeter security solutions that sit at or near the edge of your company's network, where it meets the Internet. (For more on this topic, visit our Business Security Buying Guide at *www.pcmag.com/securitybg.*)



packages that you can run on a local server, software embedded in plug-and-play appliances, or from your ISP.

For example, **Symantec BrightMail Anti-Spam 6.0** (starting at \$26 per month for 100 users) performs highly effective spam filtering and is available with an antivirus plug-in. You can run BrightMail on a Windows server, get it built into a hardware appliance, such as Borderware Technologies' **MXtreme MX-200**, or outsource this capability by choosing an ISP (such as AT&T or Earthlink) that implements BrightMail for the e-mail accounts it hosts. (Symantec Corp., *www.symantec.com*. This version not rated.)

Similarly, **MailFrontier Gateway Server** offers a Small Business Edition (starting at \$495 per year) as well as dedicated appliances and client versions. (MailFrontier Inc., *www.mailfrontier.com*. This version not rated.)

You'll have to weigh the cost, convenience, and trade-offs of each option. Appliances can be particularly appealing, because dedicated systems help hide complexity and some include antispam, firewall, remote access, and even Web filtering.

Another approach is to adopt versions of traditional security software that include central management for corporate use. For example, Zone Labs' **Integrity 5.0**

(starting at \$65 per seat) lets you set firewall policies centrally. (Zone Labs LLC, www.zonelabs.com. •••••) On the crucial antivirus front, Symantec AntiVirus Corporate Edition (starting at \$251 for five users) provides an extension of the company's antivirus product. (Symantec Corp., www .symantec.com. •••••) McAfee Active VirusScan SMB Edition (starting at \$215 for five users) also offers a similar extension. (Network Associates Technology Inc., *www.mcafee.com*. This version not rated.)

Keeping your OS up-todate against security vulnerabilities is crucial. If you're running Windows XP, start by installing **Windows XP Service Pack 2** (free)—if you haven't already. More generally, make sure your PCs check automatically for new Windows updates, or visit www .windowsupdate.com regu-

larly. (Microsoft Corp., *www.microsoft.com*. Not rated.)

Windows XP SP2 includes the new Windows Firewall, a dramatic improvement over the older Internet Connection Fire-

wall. Still, we recommend running a fullfeatured third-party firewall like Zone Labs' **ZoneAlarm Pro 5** (\$39.95 direct) on each desktop. Once you've installed a supplemental firewall, don't forget to disable SP2's built-in firewall to avoid conflicts. (Zone Labs LLC, www.zonelabs .com.

ZoneAlarm is also now available as part of

ZoneAlarm Security Suite (\$69.95 direct, plus \$24.95 a year after the first year. •••••), which includes antivirus, e-mail monitoring, Web content filtering, and IM security features. Norton Internet Security 2005 (\$69.95 direct, Symantec Corp., www. symantec.com. •••••) and McAfee Internet Security 2005 (\$69.99 direct, Network Associates Technology Inc., www.mcafee .com. •••••) offer a similar breadth of capabilities. The Norton and ZoneAlarm products are our current Editors' Choices.



Spyware and adware are an increasing concern, and even though most forms are more annoying than threatening, it pays to be protected. We haven't found any antispyware product that provides an impenetrable shield, but we have some favorites: Webroot's Spy Sweeper 3.0 (\$29.95 direct, Webroot Software Inc., www.webroot.com. •••••) and Lavasoft's Ad-Aware SE Plus 1.02 (\$26.95 direct, Lavasoft, www. lavasoftusa.com. •••••). Both are effective at alerting you to malware infestations in real time and letting you block them. The McAfee and Norton/Symantec security suites also claim to provide antispyware support, but they aren't as effective.

Finally, if you're looking for ways to cut out spam and phishing attacks (and who isn't?), consider antispam tools that are for both individual desktops and gateways. On the client side, we prefer **MailFrontier**



Gary Hecker of The Hecker Law Group, an intellectual property law firm, says that if companies selling these products were to be sued, the courts would probably rule as they did in the Sony Betamax case: As long as a product has legitimate uses that do not infringe copyright, the whole product can't be said to be infringing. • Although legal challenges are likely, William Coats, a partner with the firm of Orrick, Herrington, and Sutcliffe, says it's unlikely the recording industry will target end-users, as they are harder to trace than peer-to-peer software users.



even your PC's built-in DVD player, so if there's a song on a soundtrack or a bit of dialogue you'd like to record, this software can copy it as easily as an Internet stream.

To make a recording, first select the source program. Click Hijack to grab the audio and hit Record. You can split a recording manually into tracks or have Audio Hijack do it automatically when it detects a gap, but it won't tag the resulting songs. It also lets you schedule streaming radio recordings. If you don't have a dedicated URL for the stream, you'll have to select the station and then leave the source program running. One plus is that you can mute the stream so the sound doesn't play through your speakers. The program lets you save recordings as MP3 or AAC tracks (64 to 192 Kbps), or as AIFF or Apple Lossless files. Audio Hijack also comes with a variety of optional filters for customized effects.

DownloadStudio 2.0

This Swiss Army knife of a program can do things that none of the others can, such as grab all of the audio content from a site. In this year's Utility Guide, our June 8 issue, we awarded DownloadStudio the Editors' Choice for download manager applications. Looking at it purely as a tool for recording streaming content, we're still impressed.

To download a live stream, you have two options. If you know the stream's address, you can plug it in directly and have the program download it

extra fast from the server. If there's no address but you have the stream playing in a separate application, you'll need to open the Audio/Video Capture window in the Tools menu. The drawbacks are that you can record the live stream in only WAV or

or play and record one at the same time. Like iRadio, this application will save your files as MP3s as they are streamed, and it doesn't give you control over quality. HiTune can also record from RealPlayer or Windows Media Player.

> The program's interface looks like a work in progress. (On the Browse screen, for example, there are five identical unlabeled buttons that bring you to different browsing areas.) The documentation is also poor, written in broken English with plenty of errors, and there are no scheduling options. HiTune shows inspiration in how it lets people search for music, but it's not yet ready for the masses.

iRadio 1.3

iRadio is a trade-off: It works with only a narrow range of streaming audio content, but it offers a rich assortment of ways to search and mine that content.

Start iRadio and you'll see a ready-made library of mostly ShoutCast and Live365 streams. The search options let you pore through thousands of stations to find just the ones you want. Add your picks to the library, so you can access them again. From the library view, you can start a stream and record it. Since these are MP3 streams with tagging metadata attached, iRadio can save them as separate tracks and tag them correctly. The drawback, however, is that it will save them only as MP3 files.

iRadio streams the music itself and offers better scheduling options than the others. You can select the

exact stream you want and dictate when and how often you want it recorded. It can also burn your audio to a CD, but the Lite version, which lacks this feature, is a better deal (\$14.95 direct). If you don't need the luxury of recording streams from any application, iRadio is an excellent choice.

Replay Music 2.0

All of the apps we reviewed for this story do a solid job of recording streaming audio, but our Edi-MAGAZINE tors' Choice winner, Replay Music, goes far beyond the norm. Replay can record streamed songs from most applications, break them into individual files (either as WAV or 128- to 320-Kbps MP3 files) and even tag them with the correct song and artist info. It does this by taking a digital fingerprint of a song and comparing it with the information stored in its central server. Replay works with a variety of streams, including those from Napster and Musicmatch that require a subscription.

During testing, Replay didn't identify songs perfectly every time; it was right on about 80 percent of them. But when it can't recognize a song, you can always add the tags yourself. Replay also has built-in CD-burning controls, and it can burn CDs or send tracks to iTunes automatically. The 2.0 release, which should be out by the time you read this, offers unlimited tagging. (Version 1.0 topped out at 5,000 tagged songs.) Paid 1.0 users will automatically be upgraded to 2.0. Applian also makes Replay Radio, an excellent tool for recording scheduled Internet radio shows.

On the desktop, the Digital Satellite has connections for Ethernet, a phone, and two switched AC plugs, and it includes a fourport, powered USB 2.0 hub. The Digital Satellite is included with Apex and Maestro SmartDesks, or it can be purchased separately at OfficeMax.—*CE*

The RadioShark is sometimes less than shark-like in operation; we wish scrolling through saved programs were smoother and the cord were longer, because it can be hard to get good reception. Chicago Traveler is professional, comprehensive, and exceptionally easy to navigate. Listings for events, sites, and resources are exhaustive, but there is relatively little text on the site, and most of this feels touristy rather than "inside track." Hotels have ratings, but restaurants do not. An appealing aspect is that the advertising isn't too in your face.

Experience LA

Experience LA nearly ignores lodging and dining and focuses instead on things to see and do in the area. Activities are sorted either by region (Chinatown, Hollywood) or theme (Family Fun, Latino Heritage, Public Art, and so on). Items such as a list of farmers' markets around the city demonstrate the site's devotion to showing all sides of L.A. Insider commentary is scant at best, but advertiser presence is very light, and the site is simple to surf.


